

## LIBRARY ENRICHED BY MANY GIFTS AFTER APPEALS

HEAD OF CITY LIBRARY MAKES STATEMENT TO THE PUBLIC

### BOOK PRESENTS SUPPLEMENT SUPPLY

Friends of Local Institution Donate Valuable Volumes • New Books Coming

Mrs. M. Kiger, head of the city library here, this week made the following statement regarding the response to the appeal made to the public recently for funds for the library:

"Library work and merchandising have many points in common but the financial side differs much as the increased use of library means more wear to books and more binding and replacement is necessary. The income from the library is almost a fixed sum regardless of its activities and the value to the community is not measured in dollars and cents but in the citizenship. Never in the history of the library has the call been so great to supplement the work of the schools which is the great work of any library and never have the funds been so low, as only sufficient remained from 1922 to meet the bills incurred. To meet the need of new books would use the 1923 funds which were only sufficient to meet the needs from month to month.

"When the patrons of the library learned of the situation they were very kind to freely express their appreciation of the work the library stands for in the community and by their efforts have made it possible to obtain a budget for 1923 that will meet the needs if circulation does not increase too much.

"The timely cash gift of \$100. from the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was an inspiration to the board and enables them to place an order for books immediately instead of waiting until the school year is nearing completion.

"Other pleasant surprises were the gift of a set of the Code and session laws from Miss Marvin, a 4 volume set of Life of Washington from Judge McLamant and notice that we will receive a gift of Judge Carey's History of Oregon as soon as it is off the press.

"The book committee always has a long waiting list of best books for library purposes so its work is only to eliminate to keep within the funds allotted and hope to have the first shipment available very soon.

"Again the librarian and members of the board wish to thank each one who has so kindly interested themselves in the maintenance of the library."

## ORGANIZED LABOR TO BOOST FOR FAIR

PORTLAND, Oct. 25—Organized labor in Oregon will make a special campaign on behalf of the proposed constitutional amendment which will permit Portland to tax itself in excess of the six per cent limitation to finance the 1927 exposition.

Otto R. Hartwig, president of the Oregon Federation of Labor, proposed to visit every county of the state between now and election day, November 7, for the purpose of urging labor organizations to support this measure.

"More extensive development of Oregon will add to its prosperity," says Mr. Hartwig in discussing his proposed tour, "and we firmly believe that the 1927 exposition will be the means of bringing to Oregon more people and more money for the more rapid expansion of all lines of endeavor."

"Organized labor is not interested in the 1927 exposition merely from the point of view that it will create a large amount of profitable employment during the construction period; but it does feel that with the attraction of more people to this state will increase general prosperity, and that prosperous times mean better conditions for labor. We feel that every clerk, hod-carrier or common laborer, as well as the skilled artisan and the man of means who comes to locate in Oregon is adding to the state's prosperity and will aid in its development, and that an increased population will create demands for larger outputs in our industrial plants and through our various channels of production so that organized labor will be directly benefited in every part of the state.

"It is for these reasons that we are urging united support for the measure which will permit Portland to levy a tax of \$3,000,000 on itself for the financing of the exposition. Portland asks the rest of the state to give her this privilege, and I believe that organized labor, as a body will recognize the advantage that will come to it throughout the entire state if the exposition plans are permitted to go forward without delay."

## TO THE VOTERS OF TILLAMOOK COUNTY

As I am a candidate for the office of County Commissioner of Tillamook County in the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 7th, 1922, I respectfully solicit your support and vote at that time on the following platform and declaration of principles:

The per capita tax of Tillamook County is \$104.52, the highest of any county in the state of Oregon. The per capita tax in 1911 was \$36.14. Tillamook dairymen in 1920 received over \$2,000,000.00 for our famous cheese and our taxes for 1921 was \$805,000.00. In 1921 the Tillamook dairymen received \$1,500,000.00 and our taxes for the 1922 payments is over \$920,000.00—and this in view of the fact that the income of our dairymen had fallen off approximately \$500,000.00 or fully 25 per cent in income. Tillamook County as a whole will pay this year over one million (\$1,000,000.00) in taxes. Is it not time that something was done to put on the brakes????

I want the voters of Tillamook County to know just where I stand and if you believe as I do, favor me with your vote at the general election on Tuesday, November 7th, 1922. I hereby pledge that I will keep faith with the people.

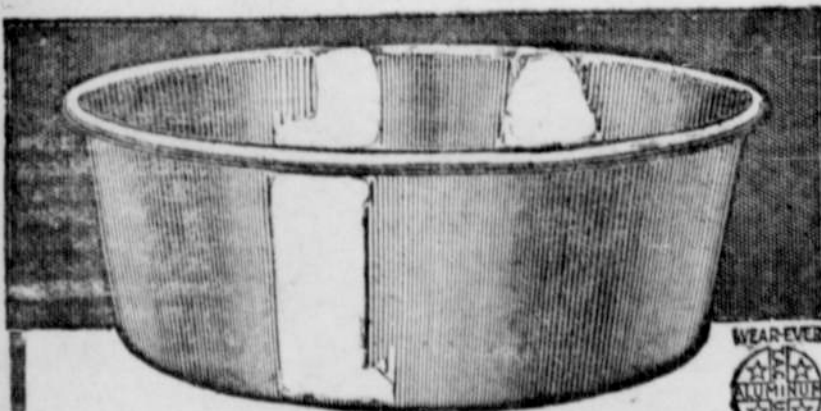
