THE LAST STRAW

The Cheesemakers Association has always tried to work in harmony with the Creamery Association. We have endeavored to render good service and turn out a high class article of production. Our one aim is to keep Tillamook cheese in the lead in all markets. We believe, and we think you will agree with us, that to get the best effort out of an employee, that employee must be satisfied. Not only satisfied with the conditions under which he works, but also satisfied with his wages in comparison with the wages paid others who work under practically the same conditions. Therefore, we feel that some form of a uniform wage is to the best interest of the cheese industry in Tillamook county.

The committee who waited upon us at our September meeting stated that it was the desire of each factory that their cheesemaker belong to the Cheesemakers' Association. It is evident that you as an Association and that each factory believes that an Association of Cheesemakers is a benefit to the Cheese Industry. Your committee also stated that the principal objection which you have to our organization is the fact that we adopt a wage scale on each factory and present it to you in a manner which makes you feel as though we were forcing it upon you. Such is not the case. Neither did we ever intend it should be that way. We merely adopted what we considered a fair wage on each factory in comparison with other factories and present it to you for your approval. You approved of it only once. That was the highest wage we ever set. When we voluntarily cut our wages 12 1/2 per cent you sent a committee to us asking us to cut more. At that time we inquired about certain other wages paid by the Creamery Association to its employees and were given to understand that they would be cut when the time came. The time has come and gone and we have not noticed the cut. We believe that what is good for the goose is good for the gander.

You as an Association sell your product, which is cheese, through your salesman here in Tillamook. He sets the price and the broker in order to get first class cheese must pay that price or go without. You say "Fine, fine, just the thing to do."

We as an Association, try to sell our product, which is our labor, to you for a uniform wage and you shout "Robber! Robber! Put them out of business!"

We fail to see where the great difference is.

Nevertheless, in order to keep peace between the two Associations we come to you offering to let you have equal say with us in determining each year's wage. By August of each year, each factory knows pretty well what they consider a fair wage for the coming year. We suggest that at the regular meetings of the two associations, at that time, that each director and each cheesemaker state his opinion. If they think the wages should be raised or lowered, state how much. If they should remain the same, say so. In that way a line on the whole County may be obtained. After hearing from each factory, we suggest that you appoint a committee of three members to work with a committee of three appointed by us, the six to choose one more member who must be an uninterested party who is acquainted with labor and financial conditions of the County. This committee of seven members will draft a wage scale for each factory in the Association which will be presented to each Association at the September meeting for approval. If the wage scale is agreeable to both Associations then let each factory in making the contract with their cheesemaker for the coming year require him to become a member of the Cheesemakers' Association and send a cheese to their monthly meetings. This would mean a re-organization of our Association, but in this way all cheesemakers would belong. That is your desire.

Isn't this a fair and square proposition? We offer to go fifty-fifty with you; offer to meet you half way and allow you to have equal say with us in determining the market price of our product, namely our labor.

Would you make such a proposition to the jobber? Would you offer to let him have equal say with you in setting the market price of your cheese?

We understand that the Creamery Association has no power over the Cheesemakers' wages. Each factory must decide that for itself. That may be so, but we fail to see how an Association that can compel one factory to make every other day all winter, or else keep Tillamook off the rind, when they haven't

even enough milk to pay expenses making every three days, can have no say in regard to Cheesemakers' wages. Was not this rule in regard to every other day milk or keep Tillamook off the rind passed at a Creamery Association meeting? We never heard of more than one director from each factory being present at the time it was passed. Were all three directors from each factory present at your meeting when it was decided that all factories should be painted cream color trimmed in white with green roof? Who hires your cheese secretary?

Isn't he hired by each factory at its annual meeting? Are all three directors present at the Creamery Association meeting when his wages are set?

We understand that you are incorporated under the laws of Oregon for the purpose of manufacturing and selling cheese. You consider your salesman very essential to the selling end of the organization. Now how in the name of common sense do you expect to manufacture cheese without a cheesemaker? Please explain.

Children Using Milk Make Most Rapid Progress

Fifty two thousand five hundred children of Los Angeles were questioned as to the amount of milk they consumed daily, their ages were recorded and heights and weights obtained. The heights and weights of these children were compared on the basis of their consumption of milk, and the figures revealed the startling fact that in every age, without exception, the milk-using children were taller and weighed more than the non-milk using children. It was also found that the milk-using children made more rapid progress in their studies. In every grade the milk-using children were slightly younger than the non-milk using children. The milk using children gained on the average 2.28 years on the non-milk using children, from the kindergarten to the eighth grade.
