



When the first four requirements have been made the local leader should report to the County Club Agent giving name of club, name of project, names of the members and copy of the program. The State Leader will then suggest to the National Club Leader that a standard club charter be issued to the Club. When all the requirements have been met a National seal of achievement will be recommended.

When a Standard Club is organized the enrollments should be on Standard Club enrollment blanks, which may be secured from the county school superintendent, countyty Club agent, County Agricultural Agent, or County Club Agent.
