COUNTY CLUB WORK

For the club year of 1922-23 a "Cee Club" has been added to the list of projects that may be carried by the boys and girls of Tillamook County according to H. C. Seymour, State Club Leader.

Club projects carried on by the boys and girls in this county during 1921-22 were calving, poultry, garden, potato, cooking, sewing, canning and homemaking.

For the coming year it is hoped that there will be even a larger enrollment in the club work.

For a standard club there must be:

- 1. At least five members working on the same project.
2. An adult local Club leader in charge during the Club year.
3. Club organization with officers.
4. A definite program of work for the Club year.
5. At least six regular Club meetings during the Club year.
6. A local Club exhibit held annually.
7. A demonstration team of three members which must give at least one public demonstration in the community.
8. A judging team chosen by competition between the members.
9. At least seventy per cent of the members completing the project and filing a final report with the State Club Leader.
10. An achievement day held at the close of the Club year.

When the first four requirements have been made the local leader should report to the County Club Agent giving name of club, name of project, names of the members and copy of the program.

When a Standard Club is organized the enrollments should be on Standard Club enrollment blanks, which may be secured from the county school superintendent, county Club agent, County Agricultural Agent, or County Club Agent.

In communities where a standard Club is not organized, either because there are not enough members or because for other reasons it is not deemed advisable, those wishing the Club work should enroll as Club members, filling out individual enrollment cards and mailing them direct to the county Club agent or State Club Leader at Corvallis, Oregon.

Club-members should be willing to do the following:

- 1. Do the project work as prescribed by the State Club Leader.
2. Attend all Club meetings.
3. Keep accurate record of all work performed.
4. Write a story of the work done during the year.
5. Make an exhibit of the Club Work.
6. Complete all work and reports.
During the month of June a two-week Summer School for Club members is conducted at the Oregon Agricultural College.

ADVERTISING PLANS MADE (Continued on page 8) was decided to order the billboard posters, but take up at a further meeting of the board the matter of deciding upon when and where they would be used. Another new feature of the 1923 Tillamook advertising, will be the publishing of a recipe booklet, with recipes prepared by Miss Alice Bradley, the head of the famous Miss Farmer's School of Cookery, Boston. Miss Bradley is also the food editor of the Woman's Home Companion, and her name attached to a recipe booklet for Tillamook will create widespread interest among women everywhere. The booklet will be offered in each advertisement published in the newspapers, and sent upon request. Besides the above features, additional store-hangers will be supplied to grocers, such as are now being used. Ads will also be taken in grocer's trade papers calling attention to Tillamook cheese—the grocer's language, impressing upon him the increased sales of cheese and rapid turnover to be made by handling Tillamook over other makes of cheese. Altogether, it is proven that Tillamook advertising of the past five years has been very effective, and aided materially in obtaining the higher price over cheese from Wisconsin and other sections. Today Tillamook is obtaining 30c for Tillamook triplets and 31c for longhorns, while Wisconsin is quoting 25c and 26 1/4c. From this it can be seen that the expenditure of a fraction of a cent to advertising, along with good quality and salesmanship, has helped Tillamook to derive a premium of five cents a pound over what dairymen of other sections are able to obtain for their cheese. Figured on its production of nearly 7,000,000 pounds a year, this means \$340,000 more money that Tillamook is obtaining for its cheese annually. This pretty well answers the question, "Does advertising pay."
