### AMERICAN LEGION MEN WILL BE MASTERS OF THE DAY

### TO BE A FEATURE OF THE DAY

Inasmuch as there is a question as to whether Armistice day, Nov. 11, is a holiday, I hereby, according to the power vested in me, proclaim Nov. 11, a legal holiday in Tillamook City.

Tomorrow will witness the celebration of the fourth anniversary of Armistice day.

The local post of The American Legion has arranged a celebration for the event that will start in the morning with a parade and end in the evening with a smoker and dance.

Company "K", 162nd Infantry, assisted by the K. P. band will parade through the streets of the city. All service men are also expected to enter the parade whether they belong to Company "K" or not.

Following this will be speaking at the city hall auditorium. J. W. Mott, city attorney of Astoria, has promised to give the address of the day, and he will be assisted by George N. Barnes as chaplain. It was thought for a time that General George A. White might be present but the general telephoned a few days ago that he could not come.

The American Legion Auxiliary will furnish a luncheon to the members of the national guard company and ex-service men at noon.

In the afternoon there will be a football game at the fair grounds between the high school team and a team from Company "K".

The evening will be taken up by a smoker at the city hall auditorium in which it is said that an excellent band has been arranged. The smoker will be followed by a dance at the K. P. hall under the auspices of the American Legion.

Most of the business houses have arranged to be closed all day tomorrow in honor of the event.

## METHODISTS TO BUILD CHURCH

A meeting of the members of the local Methodist church was held last Friday evening at which plans were considered for the building of a new church building.

### RADIUM WORTH \$2500 LOCATED AFTER HUNT

Word was received from Portland last week that a piece of radium, valued at \$2500, which had become lost while used in the treatment of a patient for nasal cancer at the home of Mrs. F. L. Nitch, 3221 63d St., S. E., had been found. The radium had been inadvertently thrown into the kitchen stove with some bandages, and it was necessary to call a professor from Reed college with an electrocope before the particle of valuable mineral was located. The search was conducted under the direction of a Mr. Lacy, agent for the Phil Grosamer company of Portland which had the radium insured.

## ARMORY PLANS ARE BEING LAID BY CITY OFFICIALS

### CITY OF TILLAMOOK WILL FURNISH THE BUILDING LOCATION

### BLOCK IN MAPLE GROVE TO BE USED

### SPECIAL ELECTION WILL BE CALLED IN THE NEAR FUTURE

Plans are now being prepared for the securing of a site to be used for an armory to be erected in the Tillamook.

The city is to furnish the site and the council approved of a plan and issued an order for a special election to be held in the near future to allow the city government to make this move. The property that is involved is Block one of Maple Grove addition. This block belongs to the city with the exception of lot 5, which is the property of J. J. Groat. The city proposes to trade Mr. Groat another lot which is in its possession in Block Three of the same addition, so as to have clear title to all of block one. Mr. Groat has signified his willingness to make this change. In this way the property will be acquired without additional cost to the city.

As to the expense of the election Mayor S. A. Moulton has personally guaranteed the expenses of this and the publishers of the city have agreed to handle all necessary legal advertising in this matter without cost to the city. This manner of handling the election is expected to raise very little opposition to the election to donate this property for armory purposes.

A small white dog of undetermined breed was struck by an automobile near the corner of Third street and Second Avenue East today and killed. The carcass was left in the street until Marshall White took it to the city hall where it was incinerated in the furnace.

Senator Walter M. Pierce has been elected governor of Oregon over Governor Olcott by a majority of 31,885, increasing the lead. Tillamook county's majority for Pierce is 1278. The result of the governorship was not unexpected to those who have been watching the races closely.

## SAWS HIS WAY OUT OF PRISON

Jay Houser, who has been in the county jail under sentence of four months for petty larceny, early this morning made his escape from the jail and at last accounts has not been apprehended.

Houser, who had served only a small part of his sentence, had not been allowed outside of the cage as two of the other prisoners had been, to work about the court house. Early this morning when Bailiff Epplett went to the basement to let out two of the prisoners to help with the janitor work of the court house, Houser was still in his bed. A few minutes later one of the prisoners called Mr. Epplett and reported that Houser was gone. Two of the bars in the window of the east side of the court house had been neatly sawed, leaving room enough for the prisoner to wedge his way through. It was about 6:45 when the escape was discovered.

Warnings were immediately sent throughout the county and state and the early capture of the fugitive is expected.

The other prisoners in the county jail are Alfred Allden, Ed Snyder, Otto Kocher and F. E. Smith. All of these disclaimed any knowledge of how Houser escaped.

### OLD FIRE WHISTLE BLOWS ITS LAST NOTE WEDNESDAY

The fire alarm that brought many Tillamook folks to the streets last Wednesday evening was the farewell toot of the old fire siren that has started chills up the backs of local people for several years.

The firemen were not warned that the false alarm was to be given and responded well to the supposed emergency. They had manned the engine and were out of the engine house within fifty seconds from the time the alarm sounded, which is considered good time. The blowing of the whistle also indicated the dying gasp of the old boilers of the Coast Power company, which has been supplying steam for the fire alarms for some years past.

### LIGHTS FOR THE CITY SUPPLIED BY GARIBALDI

The light plant here of the Coast Power company closed down this week and the machinery is being rapidly dismantled. While the local power plant is out of order Tillamook is receiving its electric power from the Whitney mills at Garibaldi.

It has been stated by the Coast Power people that it is expected to have the new machinery installed and in working order by February first. Part of the new equipment is on the ground already, and it will be put in place as soon as room is made for it.

### TILLAMOOK COUNTY VOTES CONSISTENTLY THROUGHOUT

Consistently in its voting for the general election Tuesday. The two most important ballot were the contest for governor and the school measure.

Walter M. Pierce carried Tillamook county by a large majority over Olcott. When the votes were all counted and the results made known it was found that but four precincts went for the present governor—Netarts, Trask, Bayocean and Neskowin. Rockaway precinct had 39 votes each for Pierce and Olcott.

The school bill was voted against in five precincts. Netarts, Trask, Rockaway, Bayocean and Neskowin went against the bill, while Little Nestucca and Long Prairie both cast an even ballot for the measure. Little Nestucca 24 votes each way and Long Prairie 24.

Gilbert Alein, of the insurance department of the state fire marshal's office, is in the city on business pertaining to his headquarters.

### TILLAMOOK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE INITIATES MOVEMENT

### COAST TOWNS ASKED TO CO-OPERATE

### MEETING MAY BE HELD IN PORTLAND IN NEAR FUTURE

A number of the members of the Chamber of Commerce met in the chamber room yesterday and drafted the following telegram which was sent to several community organizations along the Oregon coast:

"At meeting of Tillamook Chamber of Commerce today, it was voted imperative that a coast county man be presented to Governor-Elect Pierce as a possible appointee on the new State Highway Commission. To this end we recommend that a meeting be held at Imperial Hotel, Portland, Friday, November 17, at two o'clock, and that each Chamber of Commerce or other organization in your county be represented by one or more delegates to decide on one or more qualified persons from the coast to be placed before the governor-elect as a possible appointee. In our opinion this is the most important appointment to the people of the coast counties to be made by the governor. Please take this matter up with other organizations in your county and have them get behind the movement and be represented at the meeting. Please advise regarding your action. Tillamook Chamber of Commerce."

The commercial organizations to which the telegram was sent were: Astoria, Seaside, Toledo, Newport, Florence, North Bend, Marshfield, Bandon and Gold Beach. It is the intention of the local Chamber of Commerce to push the improvement of the Roosevelt highway as much as possible within the next few years, believing that in doing so they will help bring greater wealth to this portion of the state.
