## ARMORY ELECTION NEXT MONDAY IS TO DONATE SITE

On Monday, December 18, a special election will be held in the City hall in Tillamook City, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of Tillamook City the question of dedicating to the General Staff of Oregon, block 1, of Maple Grove addition and to exchange lot 5 of that block which is the only lot in said block that has a building upon it, for lot 1, block 3, of same addition, thereby having the entire block clear of all buildings.

The block is to be deeded to the General Staff contingent upon the creation of an Armory for Co. K, of the National Guard and to be a memorial to the American Legion and those who gave their lives in the World War.

The donation of this block is the portion that the city is expected to give, the county also being authorized by an act of the Legislature to set aside a sum for memorial purposes, and the state HAS set aside \$20,000 for Co. K which was supposed to have gone to the City of Independence, but through their failure to meet requirements, Co. K was organized and is in a flourishing condition in our own city.

Co. K is now drilling in the High School gymnasium, where facilities are not conducive to greatest development, so an armory will be a great asset to the community to house Co. K and give them ample room for drills and etc.

With an armory capable of seating a large audience, Tillamook City will become a most ideal place for conventions, and more people will learn of the wonderful advantages of location and climate, and our beach resorts, and also spend considerable sums of money while here.

This donation of Block 1 will not necessitate any bond issue and no increase of taxes as the City has had to take of the same for delinquent street assessments.

## OCTOBER MILK CHECKS TO BE OUT SATURDAY

Checks will be out this Saturday for October milk. Payments run as high as 72c for butter fat, this being paid by the Tillamook Creamery and the Holstein factory. Tests are running very high. This brings the 100 lb. milk prices very high. For instance, Maple Leaf average tests run 4.7 per cent and with 71c for butter fat paid there, makes the average 100 lbs. milk bring \$3.33. Fairview average test is 4.98 and with 68c paid there for butter fat, brings the average per 100 lbs. milk to \$3.38.

October, 1921, cheese sold for \$141,360.54. October cheese this year sold for \$182,899.32, or \$41,538.78 more than last year. Most of this is accounted for by higher prices received this year, for while the increase in production was 17 per cent, the value of the cheese showed an increase of over 29 per cent.

## NEW CREAMERY AT MOHLER NOW COMPLETED

Standing on an elevation and overlooking the surrounding country is the recently completed creamery at Mohler. The building was completed the first of the week and the machinery and equipment that had been in the Mohler cannery, which was used for cheese making since the factory burned in September was moved into the new structure Monday and the first cheese made Tuesday.

The new building, machinery and equipment are modern in every respect. The main structure is 110x34 feet with a boiler room 18x26 and a roofed receiving station 12x20. One vat is in use now, this being ample to handle the milk—5000 lbs. daily—at this time, but three more vats will be added before spring which will give the plant a capacity of 30,000 gallons of milk a day or around 3,500 pounds of cheese.

The creamery is largely the result of the faithful work on the part of A. D. Lommen, who hustled around and interested the farmers in building a co-operative plant when the one owned by R. Zweifel was destroyed by fire.

The directors of the institution are R. Zweifel, E. A. Blackmore and A. D. Lommen, Mr. Blackmore being president and Mr. Lommen vice-reporter.

## NEHALEM BAY IMPROVEMENT RECOMMENDED

The government budget for rivers and harbors improvements includes \$252,000 for the improvement of the Nehalem bay. The amount was recommended by the army engineers, and, with the exception of the Columbia river and Coos bay, is the largest sum recommended for any north west river or harbor project. The amount is included in and is under the authorization already made by congress and it is likely that congress will pass the bill amounting to \$27,635,670 for the entire country.

## OUTSIDE SUBSCRIBERS TO PAY MORE JAN. 1st

## LOCAL PUBLIC UTILITY CONCERN ISSUES BONDS

The Coast Power company recently sold bonds to the amount of \$150,000 to a Portland bank. This amount will be used to make the improvements now being put in here by the power company and supercede a \$50,000 bond issue that formerly was placed on the plant.

The power company has been authorized by the state corporation commission to issue bonds to the extent of \$1,000,000. C. J. Edwards, manager of the company, states that these will not be issued for some time but that that amount may possibly be needed within the next twenty years for improvements in case the county grows to such an extent. These bonds will not be sold until needed. The recent issues by the Coast Power company draw 6 per cent.

A meeting of the business men of the city was called Thursday afternoon to determine what steps Tillamook should take toward the relief of Astoria. Carl Haberlach acting for the Creamery association, pledged \$500 and it was thought possible to raise \$1500 aside from this. H. H. Rosenberg, E. C. Baker and Rollie Watson were appointed on a committee to canvas the town to secure this amount. This afternoon Mr. Rosenberg reported that a total of \$1700 had been pledged leaving \$300 yet to be raised. An earnest effort is being made to bring the total up to \$2000 before night.

A meeting has been called for this evening by the mayor at the city hall at which time it is hoped the relief work will be completed.
