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Much disappointment was expressed by the people of this end of the county when they learned that no appropriation had been made in the 1923 county budget for the completion of the Brighton-Manhattan road.

Once upon a time the tiny Blueback salmon swarmed the Columbia river and so plentiful were they that during one season over four million pounds were canned on the Oregon side of the river.

The Blueback was a wonderful little salmon. It averaged between six and eight pounds and its meat was fiery red. When canned it was second only to the fancy Sockeye and Alaska Red.

The Columbia River Blueback was a lake spawning salmon, most of them being born in Lake Wallowa, which is hundreds of miles from the ocean, and theirs was an interesting trip to trace on the map.

The fish-wheels took ninety per cent of the Bluebacks entering the river. The traps and seines took the rest. But the Columbia could be restocked with these wonderful little salmon in five years if there were no fish-wheels to stop them from entering to Wallowa lake to breed.

The Blueback, because of its economical shipping size and exceptional baking flavor, should be the fish for the farmer's plate and purse. How many farmers in the interior of Oregon and Washington, remote from the river, get a taste of the thousands of Sockeyes that had been artificially hatched in the Columbia river last summer and got one reached Wallowa lake to spawn.
