We are a little curious to know what the attitude of the state legislature is going to be in providing money for state highways, and so are a number of counties that have highways that are incomplete. It certainly would be a grave mistake for the state legislature to provide nothing for extensions. No doubt, however, the legislature will be inclined to economize and retrench, and there is no objection to this if retrenchment can be worked out in every department, but to our way of thinking it would be unwise not to provide sufficient money to carry out the State highway commission's road plan and complete the work as soon as possible. In fact, it would be decidedly unfair, for if it was good judgment and good business sense to complete the Columbia and Pacific highways, it is also good business judgment and good sense to complete the Roosevelt highway and other incomplete highways in the state. So the question naturally arises a state present time. Is the state going ahead with its state road program or going to lay down and get into the do-nothing attitude of indifference at a time when the states to the north and south are forging a head in road building.

In discussing the matter and plans for the development of Oregon, taken up by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, the development of the cheese industry of Tillamook county is a good criterion of what can be accomplished with co-operation and the right kind of men to look after

the business end. What the dairymen have done to standardize Tillamook cheese, placing a dependable superior highgrade cheese on the market, should be followed in all other lines of agricultural products. Quality counts when it comes to marketing and this is where Oregon should strive to excel in an effort to develop the land resources of the state.

Tillamook did the right thing when it was decided to raise \$2000 for the sufferers in the Astoria fire. Words of sympathy may be encouraging, but sympathy alone will not provide food and relief for those who have lost heavily by a fire catastrophe. This is how Tillamook looked at the situation and did the right thing when \$2000 was raised in hard cash for Astoria's relief. It was a genuine neighborly act on the part of the people of this city and the Creamery association, and there is every assurance that the money will be properly used. In this connection it is proper to mention the generous spirit displayed by the Tillamook County Creamery association with a subscription of \$500, and with subscriptions of \$100.00 each from the First National Bank, Tillamook County Bank, Coast Power company, A. F. Coats Lumber company, and B. C. Lamb, who were the largest subscribers, making one-half of the amount of the money raised. There were some business men who were not in a position to subscribe as liberally as they would have liked and as every person knows his own financial conditions best, no one should criticize them on that account. It was a free will offering with the Christmas spirit predominating those who undertook the responsibility of raising the \$2000 and those who subscribed. We wish to extend our thanks to those who subscribed and those who worked in bringing about so flattering results.

The gradual increase of industries in Tillamook county plainly shows that they will continue to increase more in the future than they have in the past, making the entire county a live industrial center. No one need lose faith in Tillamook, for it is going to grow and prosper.
