### PORTLAND-TILLAMOOK RAIL LOOP SEEN IN NEAR FUTURE

Last week the Sheridan Sun had the following to say of Southern Pacific improvements, which will be of interest to Tillamook people:

Rail improvements by the Southern Pacific company on its line between here and Whitefish were started this week that hold promise of future development. The laying of 39-pound rails, of main line weight, begun some time ago and completed between here and Whitefish and then suspended, was resumed. Although there is very heavy traffic over this line because of the movement of logs, and ostensibly the rails are to accommodate this traffic there is said to be reasons to believe the improvements contemplate extension of the line to join with the line now ending at Tillamook. When this is done it will make a loop road from Portland to Tillamook via Hillsboro and Timber on the north side and Newberg and Sheridan on the south. The north side was built first with a bad grade and through a difficult pass because, as it is said, the timber made that route the most practicable as a business proposition. The pass via Sheridan is the easiest and the road from New Grand Ronde could be extended with little difficulty. The loop route would be wonderfully scenic and present a beautiful panorama to the traveler who made the complete loop from Portland. There would be the mountainous regions with their lumbering activities on the north through which one would pass to have the view suddenly burst upon the ocean breakers. Thence the way would lead along the beach to Tillamook and back in to the mountains through the dairy country and emerge into the valley of the southern side with their checkerboard array of farms and orchards. Such a loop would make the beaches of Tillamook the playground of the west, it is freely predicted, and the trip would become popular with tourists.

### AWARD HONOR TO CONFUCIUS

Earliest Idea of the "Shadow Show" Said to Have Been Recorded 500 Years B. C.

That the earliest idea of a moving picture was recorded in the time of Confucius, the Chinese philosopher who lived 500 years before Christ, is the deduction drawn from study of the question by Will Day, a well-known figure in the English film world, who has exhibited in London a collection of relics and machines tracing the growth of the moving picture from the first primitive idea to its present form, says an exchange.

The "shadow shows" of Confucius are the first of all known endeavors to present animated pictures. The next period of progressive achievement is found in 1646 when Athanasius Kircher published a book in Latin entitled "Ars Magna Luce et Umbra," in which a description and illustration are given of a moving picture which the writer had evolved with mirrors and a tallow candle for illuminant.

Included in the collection is the original disk which Edvard Muybridge used to settle the controversy between two American millionaires on the Palo Alto race course as to whether the four feet of a trotting horse were off the ground at the same time.

To the Owners and All persons interested in the lands corporate and other property in and adjacent to Tillamook Drainage District:

You, and each of you, are hereby notified that the Board of Supervisors of Tillamook County, Oregon, has filed in the office of the County Clerk of Tillamook County, Oregon, a petition praying the County Court to amend the decree entered by the County Court of said County on the 21st day of February, 1919, wherein and whereby it was ordered that the boundaries of said Drainage District be extended by including therein its estate in Tillamook county, Oregon, to wit:

Beginning at a point 20 feet east of the west line of Section 31 in Township 1 south of Range 9 west, W. M., and 30 rods south of the said point being the northwest corner of the original Tillamook Drainage District, as described in the petition thereof, and running thence north to the north line of said Section 31; thence east to the west line extended of Third Avenue east, in Tillamook City, Oregon, and running thence north to a point 60 feet west of the southwest corner of Block 20 of Thayer's Addition to what is now Tillamook City, Oregon, and running thence east along the south line of said Thayer's Addition, or Additions, and an extension thereof to a point south of the southeast corner of Block 14, of A. A. Miller's Addition to the town of Tillamook, now Tillamook City, Oregon; thence north to the southwest corner of said Block 14; thence east to the southwest corner of Block 15; of said Miller's Addition; thence north to the northeast corner of said Block 15; thence east to the northeast corner of said Block 13 of said Miller's Addition; thence east to the east line of Lot 4 in Eli Goodspeed's Park, according to the recorded plat thereof; thence south to a point 50 feet south of the south line of said Goodspeed's Park; thence west to the northeast corner of Block 1 of High Land Addition to Tillamook City; thence south to the southeast corner of said Block 1; thence west to the west line of said High Land Addition; thence south to the north line of Section 31 aforesaid; thence west 300 feet; thence south 30 rods, more or less, to the north line of Tillamook Drainage District, as originally established; thence west to the place of beginning. 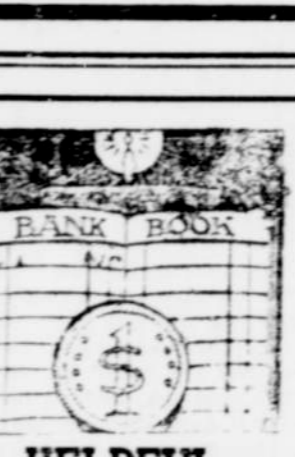
