RAILROAD TALK STIRSTIMBERMEN

Rumor is afloat in Portland that the Southern Pacific company is planning another route to Tillamook, to come by way of Sheridan and Willamina. It is thought that the road, if built, will connect up with the present line of the same company running to Hillsboro.

The plans are made probably to prevent encroachment on the traffic that is expected in the future in untapped sections of Yamhill, Polk and Lincoln counties. This traffic will be composed mostly of timber shipments when the great tracts on the south of this county are opened for development.

Timber owners have been very optimistic regarding the building of the new railroad as the next great body of timber to be cut will doubtless be the body to the south of Tillamook county. Future developments will show what there is to this rumor.

COURT SESSION IN SECOND WEEK

The second week of the circuit court session for February 1923, was marked by several civil suits.

The case of Frank Bramwell, state superintendent of banks versus Louis Ludke, an action to collect money on a note supposed to have been connected with the failure of the N. Halem Valley Bank. It was tried the first part of the week. Judge Bagley directed a verdict for the defendant.

Jesse Earl versus Ed Earl, in a suit that lasted two days, was given a claim of \$1400 for the care of John J. Earl deceased. The plaintiff had put in claim for \$2100 for taking care of the uncle, John Earl for a period of about ten years before his death. The county court cut this amount in half, but Ed Earl, the administrator of the estate, objected to this decision and appealed to the circuit court, where the larger amount was allowed.

A divorce decree was granted in the case of Ethel Huginen versus Wilfred Huginen.

The case of Clyde Makinster against W. Johnson and Chessel Mills grew out of the arrest of Makinster for a violation of the fishing laws last summer. Makinster was acquitted in the justice court, but the Johnson, who is a fish warden withheld the fish net that was confiscated so Makinster sued for time lost while the net was being held and for damage to the net while in the hands of Johnson. The jury gave a verdict of \$226.67 damages for the plaintiff.

Clarence B. Nelson vs. State Industrial Accident Commission was a case that arose out of the failure of the commission to pay state aid to the satisfaction of the plaintiff who lost the sight of one eye while fighting fire near Belding last summer. Attorneys for both sides got together and demanded an appeal on condition that Nelson wait three months before concluding the case, in hope that the eyesight might be restored within that time. In case the eye is permanently lost certain damages will be paid.

Beginning next Monday a number of criminal cases will be heard before the circuit court.
