COURT ADJOURNS TO NEXT MONDAY

The court adjourned last Wednesday to meet again next Monday.

In the case of T. R. Pollock vs. Julius Erickson for damages resulting from the plaintiff being hit by Erickson's automobile last summer, the jury rendered a verdict for \$275 as damages to the plaintiff. Pollock had sued for \$10,000 damages and \$70 doctor's fees.

E. F. Smith received a judgment against the Mill Spruce company for wages due him and others who worked for the milling concern.

In the case of the state vs. Daniel Peters for grand larceny, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

In the two cases of the state against James S. Graham, the non support case was dismissed on account of a technicality and the larceny by bailee charge was compromised.

Alfred Ahlden, a prisoner in the county jail was tried for threatening to kill T. E. Epplert, the jailer, and was found guilty.
