MOOSE TO GIVE ANNUAL ENDOWMENT BALL MAR. 15

On Thursday evening, March 15, the local lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose will give their annual endowment ball.

The endowment ball is an annual affair with the Moose lodges throughout the United States, the proceeds derived therefrom being donated by the various lodges to Mooseheart, Mooseheart is a home for the orphan and destitute children of deceased members of the Moose. It consists of something near 1000 acres of high land, fertile farm lands on the banks of the Fox river in Illinois on which is located the town of Mooseheart. The town consists of buildings of all descriptions sufficient to accommodate these children, of which there are now 1150 being fed, clothed and educated thru the primary and high school grades. The homes for the children are maintained in cottages, 39 children being the limit for each cottage, each of which is in charge of a "Mother" who is often an widow or some dependent of a deceased Moose, sufficient help being provided for the care and comfort of the group. This plan has been found much more satisfactory than the usual plan of institutions of this character, where the entire attendance is kept under one roof.

In many instances the lodges of a state provide a fund sufficient to build and equip a cottage for their particular state, an effort being made in 1921 by the lodges of Oregon to carry out this sort of a program. The effort failed, however and the project was temporarily abandoned.

The annual affair is given in February by practically all lodges but the local lodge has chosen March in order not to conflict with the Firemen's Ball which is always given in February. The Mooseheart Endowment ball is always one of the best attended balls of the year.

WHAT IS THE LIFE OF CORRUGATED CULVERT PIPE?

weight being much lighter. There is also from 25 to 40 per cent saving in the amount of excavating and backfilling for a corrugated culvert over heavier and thicker wall culverts.
