COW TESTING ASS'N MAKES GREAT GAIN

Organization Is Of Much
Value To The
Dairymen

1922 PROFITABLE YEAR

EXPECTED TO BE OVER 3,000
COWS TESTED SOON

The Tillamook county cow testing association has closed a very successful and profitable year according to the printed report which shows 2,314 cows have been in the association with an average of about 332 pounds of butter fat to the cow. This is considered a remarkable record for such an organization.

Not only is the testing reports profitable for the dairymen but it has created a market for the calves coming from this county. Last year \$2,873 was brought into the county thru the county agent's office from the sale of these calves and \$1300 was returned to prospective customers on account of the class of calves that had been advertised were not available.

The expenses for the past year for the testing totalled \$3900, which is only slightly more than the amount that has been received for the calves shipped. The approaching freshening season is expected to increase the sales to a large extent. The calves have been shipped to Idaho, Montana, Washington and California, beside many to various parts of this state.

Just at present there is a campaign taking place to increase the number of cows in the testing association. In 1921 there were 1100 cows in the association; last year there were 2600, and this year there are expected to be over 3000. The dairymen are beginning to fully appreciate the usefulness of the testing association and are becoming quick to take advantage of it.

BOVINE ABORTION IS BEING STUDIED

Dr. Fred W. Miller of the O. A. C. Experiment station has been sent to Tillamook county to assist Dr. J. N. Shaw with the eradication of bovine abortion, which has been very troublesome in this section.

CHEESE QUOTATIONS ARE SHOWN ON CHART

The higher prices and smaller fluctuations of the local product are well illustrated on the charts.

"INSANITY" FAKER HAS PRISON RECORD

SERVED TERM IN WASHINGTON
FOR BURGLARY

Robert McCarty, alias Henry Wood who was arrested some time ago by the city authorities and is now in the city jail awaiting disposition of the state authorities, has been found to have a penitentiary record in the state of Washington.

Sheriff Aschm, in examining the man, suspected from his actions that he had something he was trying to conceal and decided that he must be an ex-convict. Upon writing to various penal institutions it was learned that McCarty was committed to the Washington state penitentiary from Seattle in 1903 for burglary for ten years. He went under the name there of Robert McCarty and Robert McCarty and was a waiter. The description tallies. On the picture sent from the Washington prison McCarty is shown with a long gash on the left side of his throat, evidently self-inflicted. Sheriff Aschm has now written to Fort Leavenworth for further information regarding him. It is thought probable that McCarty was the one who attempted to open the safe in the office of the Crystal Steam laundry several weeks ago.

SPELLING CONTEST RESULTS IMPROVE

414 Pupils Of The County
Make Grades Of
Perfect

SCHOOLS ARE TO JOIN

LAST TEACHERS INSTITUTE TO
MEET HERE SOON

The recent spelling contest resulted very well. The first one held some time ago showed 324 pupils in the county had received 100 per cent and 342 with grades of from 94 to 99 per cent. The second contest showed 414 pupils with 100 per cent and 346 with 94 to 99 per cent. A very large number of the pupils of the county received 90 per cent or over, which is considered a very good grade.

There will be a hearing before the school district board on Saturday, March 24, to consider the consolidation of the Garibaldi school district with the Miami school district. There is now a movement on foot at Garibaldi to establish a four-year standard high school at Garibaldi.

Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill is expected to be here in the near future to inspect the high schools of the county.

The last local teacher's institute for the year will be held in this city April 21. Arrangements have been made whereby State Superintendent Churchill will be present. It is also expected that President J. S. Landers of the state normal school at Monmouth will be at the meeting.

MONTHLY MUSTER HELD NEXT MONDAY

LOCAL UNIT HAS SET RECORD
FOR UNITED STATES

In January the local national guard company passed all previous records in the state for drill attendance. Last month the mark was raised nearly two per cent. COUNTY ROAD WORK TO COMMENCE SOON

Many Road Jobs Are On
The Program For
Next Season

WAITING ON WEATHER

BRIGHTON - MANHATTAN ROAD
MAY NOT GO THRU

County Judge Homer Mason stated this week that the 1923 road program will start in earnest within the next two or three weeks. Some bits of road work have started already but the main construction will necessarily have to wait until the weather can be depended upon.

A number of specifications for different road jobs are now under consideration. The plans for the improvement of the Netarts road have been finished as are also the plans for the improvement of the road on the north side of Wilson river.

The contract for the piling has been let to Walter Woods for the Bayocean road. The government dredge will start the filling as soon as the piling are driven and the planking in place.

A steam shovel has been working on the road bed at the Hellenbrand place on the Nestucca river near Oretown, and County Commissioner Richards has a gang of rock men on the ledge above Oretown. The Cloverdale quarry will be in operation in about ten days.

Negotiations will soon be completed for the Manhattan-Brighton road, though it is not thought possible to get the work started this year on account of the slowness of the railroad company in deciding as to whether or not they will let the county use their road bed for the highway. The survey and location has been completed for this stretch.

FIRE DEPARTMENT HAS NEW TRUCK

The local fire department is building a new ladder truck to take the place of the old one that has been in use for many years. The firemen have wanted a new machine for some time but the money was not available. The finances for the new machine were raised partly by dances given by the firemen and partly by contributions, a large part of which was given by the Whitney company of Garibaldi.

SIDEWALKS ARE BAD SAYS CITY COUNCIL

EMERGENCY CLAUSE ADDED
TO DRY ORDINANCE

The city council met in regular session Monday night, with all members present. A. G. Beals appeared with the plans of his building and was given permission to use the south half of 3rd street between 2nd and 3rd Ave. east during construction of the building. The council also decided to accept the old survey line and allow Mr. Beals to put his building on a line with the rest of the buildings on that street.

Mrs. W. T. Newcomb was given permission to construct a sewer to Hoquarton.

The street committee on sidewalks reported that there is much bad board walk and many cement walks needed. The council ordered that these walks be put in at once. A cement sidewalk ordinance was passed creating a cement sidewalk district on all paved streets.

The city attorney was authorized to give Mrs. Alice Wolfe a quitclaim deed to the section of property between her property and the street.

On account of the disturbance caused by drunkenness and bootlegging in the city lately, the council added an emergency clause to the prohibition ordinance which was recently passed making it effective at once.

Owing to a retrenchment in all lines the council decided to cut the salary of the city recorder to \$135.

PREVENTION SHOWN IN MOVING PICTURES

Two moving picture, "Out of the Shadows" and "Partners", both issued by the United States government, have been shown at various places about the county by County Agent W. D. Pine and Dr. J. N. Shaw. The first picture deals with bovine tuberculosis and the latter with boys and girls club work. The pictures have been shown at Oretown, Cloverdale, Sandlake, Blaine, Fairview, Pleasant Valley, Miami and Mohler.

STATE CLUB LEADER HERE TO ORGANIZE

L. J. Allen, state club leader, has been in the county for the past few days working in conjunction with D. H. Kennedy, local club leader, in organizing more Boy's and Girl's clubs. Existing clubs were visited by the state leader also.

Mr. Allen reports that a large number of livestock clubs are being organized throughout the state this year and that he expects to see a record exhibit at the state fair and International stock show this fall.

BURGLAR ALARM PROTECTS MONEY

Complete In Every

DUPLICATE PROTECTION

HOLD-UP SYSTEM ALSO PUT
IN THE BANK
