REPORT OF TILLAMOOK COW TESTING ASSOCIATION FOR YEAR ENDING MARCH 1st

During the year 2,617 cows were tested but as some of the herds quit during the year only 2,314 cows finished their 12 months test. These 2,314 cows averaged 7,618 lbs of milk and 831.71 lbs. of fat, 203 unprofitable cows were sold to the butcher or beefed and 42 good cows were sold for dairy purposes.

Following is a list of herds averaging 400 lbs of fat or better for the year. In the order named is given the name of the owner, number of cows, breed, average milk and average fat:

The high pure bred cow for the year was owned by H. C. White of Beaver. She is Princess, a registered Jersey and on two milkings a day she produced during the year 13,138 lbs. of milk and 616.17 lbs. of fat.

The high grade cow is owned by Mrs. Joe Donaldson. She is No. 20, a Jersey and during the year produced 14,149 lbs. of milk and 694.21 lbs. of fat. This cow also was milked twice a day.

The only purebred herd in the association was that of Homer Mason. They are all pure bred Guernseys and consists of 3 two-year olds, 3 three-year olds, 2 four year olds and 3 mature cows. This herd averaged 8,552 lbs of milk and 419.24 lbs. of fat.

WRITE AS YOU TALK

ON THE TELEPHONE

Writers of business letters, a recent article in Forbes suggests, may well take a leaf from the book of the telephone talker.

Begin your letter, it advises, as you do a telephone conversation, like this:

Good Morning, Mr. Reader

Nelson C. Durand speaking.

Declaring that the idea originated at a recent Direct Advertising Convention, the writer cites several reasons for adopting the change:

"It helps dictation. Repeat the telephone salutation aloud, as if in dictation, and note the mental effect of telephoning.

"It makes a more readable letter. The cheery 'Good Morning' says some

thing; 'Dear Sir' means nothing. And it is good business to have your typed name at the start. How often do we read into a letter—stop—turn to the bottom signature and then perhaps to a cold statement in type on the side, 'Dictated by—.' Moreover the effect of saying in the salutation that you are 'speaking' follows through in reading, suggesting personal attention and human interest.

"It shortens a letter without terseness—if the writer understands the purpose of the telephone salutation and is instructed to make his dictation about as he would telephone.

"It requires no more typing. The firm that sees more work in using the telephone salutation should compare it with the desirable and common practice of typing the signature at the side to insure readability. In the new form the type name is merely placed where it does the most service.

"The value of the telephone salutation lies in its ordinary, yet wholesome wording with a splendid effect on the character of the letter. Mere changes in old customs of letter writing that have no basis of reason can never expect to become a standard practice. But it seems that here is a substitute for our dear old 'Dear Sir' that can be widely adopted with profit."
