HIGH SCHOOLS WITH DORMITORIES

In several states having large sparsely settled areas in which the consolidation of rural schools is impracticable, dormitories are maintained in connection with public high schools. Among these states are California, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, Nebraska, Utah and West Virginia. Montana reports a larger number located in remote sections than any other states. In 1920 the state department of education in that state reported that 15 dormitories housed 365 boys and girls, most of whom have been unable to attend high school had it not been for the dormitory privileges furnished. Distances from which the students came ranged from three to 95 miles. In the states mentioned the dormitories are maintained at cost. Matrons in charge of the girls' dormitories and one or more men teachers live in the boys' dormitories and are responsible for the discipline. Student co-operation is sought in dormitory ethical clubs. The schools generally assume some responsibility for the social and religious welfare of the students. Lecture courses, school parties, literary societies and athletic clubs are encouraged. Students are urged to attend the churches of their choice on Sundays.

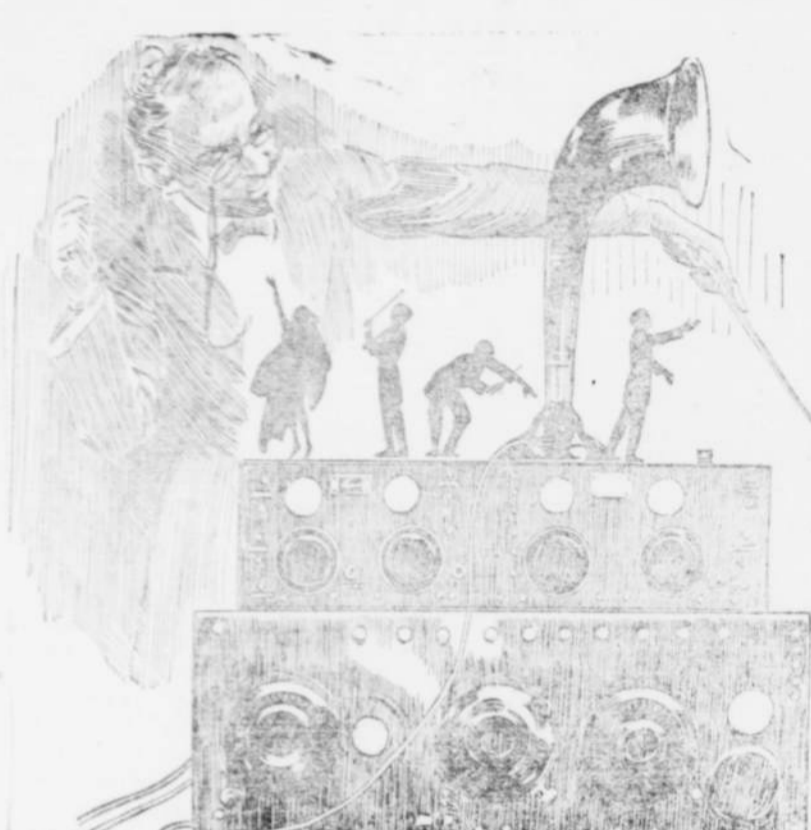
