BURIED ANOTHER FOR CONVICT SON

Mother Buries Body of Man Killed in Railroad Accident as That of Her Boy.

IT'S STRANGE, WEIRD STORY

After Five Years in Prison Son Writes to His Mother Under Assumed Name, Inquiring About Her Son.

Birmingham, Ala.—Buried in the little family lot of a cemetery near Gadsden, Ala., and grieved as dead by a sorrowing mother for five years, Clarence Peters turned up alive in the state prison. It's a strange story, weird in detail, but altogether true.

In 1917 Peters, alias Jim Holloway, was arrested in Morgan county as a member of a gang of thieves operating in Decatur. Two comrades were captured, while five others escaped. Peters refused to squeal on his pals and took a five-year sentence, while the others went free. Peters, still known only by the name of Holloway, began his prison sentence while under twenty. In 1918 he escaped from the state prison and stayed at his mother's home in Gadsden several weeks before leaving for the West. His mother and brothers never knew he was going under the name of Holloway.

Never Knew of Return.

A short while after he escaped from prison he was captured in a western state and sent to Alabama, where prison bars awaited him, but his relatives at Gadsden never knew of his return. In the latter part of 1919 a message was received from a small town in Iowa by Mrs. Peters, Clarence's mother, that a young man answering her son's description had been killed in a railroad wreck, and that letters taken from his pockets bore the name of "Clarence Peters, Gadsden, Ala."

The body was sent to Mrs. Peters and grieved over by the mother and sons. The head and face were so badly mutilated that close identification was impossible, though the size of the body and color of the hair filled the description of Clarence. A tombstone purchased by the family was placed at the head of the grave, but Clarence, ignorant of the cruel joke, served on in the penitentiary. He refused to convey news of his capture to his mother, and the incident was forgotten in Gadsden.

Wrote His Mother.

In 1922 Peters could no longer refrain from writing home, and under the name of Jim Holloway wrote his mother inquiring of her son's whereabouts and feigning friendship with young Peters.

His mother, a deeply religious woman, wrote, thanking him for the interest manifested in her son, telling him of her son's tragic death and urging him to take the warning and live an upright life. The tender words of the sorrowing mother so touched young Peters and so overwhelmed him with surprise over his supposed death that he immediately wrote the whole truth to his mother and Mrs. Peters was soon clasping her son to her bosom behind the prison bars.

LENGTHY SESSION OF CONGRESS ENDS

President Approves the Farm Credits Bill During Last Hours of Session.

Washington, D. C.—The 67th congress, which had spent a greater proportion of its two years' span of life in actual session than any other in the history of the country, adjourned sine die at noon Sunday.

During the last few hours of the session President Harding signed the farm credits bill and 98 other measures. No legislation was vetoed.

The last bill to become law was the "better butter" measure, changing butterfat standards. An important measure placed on the statute books at the last moment was the one providing for return to enemy alien owners of all seized property worth \$10,000 or less.

The farm credits bill was one of the last measures to be enacted by the 67th congress, and rushed to the White House after final senate action, where the president affixed his signature before going to the capitol to sign the flood of last-minute bills.

The measure was fostered by the farm bloc and contains the principal provisions of the Capper-Lenroot-Anderson-Strong bills. As approved by congress the outstanding features of the bill are: Creation of a system of national agricultural credits; formation of co-operative associations with a capital of \$200,000 each, to make loans to large livestock producers. Creation of a system of federal intermediate credit banks with a capital of \$5,000,000 each, to make long-term loans to the farmers under the supervision of the farm loan boards. Increases of the maximum loans that may be made by farm land banks from \$10,000 to \$25,000. Creation of a commission of three senators and five representatives to investigate and report on means of encouraging state banks to become members of the federal reserve system.

WILL INVESTIGATE CHICAGO CITY HALL

Chicago.—A grand jury investigation of the city hall of Chicago was authorized by Judge M. L. McKinley, chief justice of the criminal court of Cook county, when he broadened the scope of the special grand jury which had investigated school board affairs and indicted more than a score of persons, including Fred Lundin, ex-representative in congress and reputed "boss" of Mayor William Hale Thompson's political organization.

For months there has been rumors that Mayor Thompson's administration in the city hall would be put under fire by State Attorney-General Brundage's department, as had been done in the school investigation, in which it was charged that a gigantic conspiracy existed to mulct the schools of more than \$1,000,000 and that the schools had been defrauded of more than that amount in questionable business dealings involving many commodities and supplies.

GOLD INQUIRY IS ORDERED

Silver Industry Also is to Be Investigated by Committee of Congress.

Washington, D. C.—An investigation during the recess of congress into the gold and silver industry was ordered by the senate. A commission of five was created to conduct the inquiry.

The resolution creating the commission provides for inquiry into causes of the depressed condition of the industry, the production, marketing, transportation, sales and use of gold and silver and the effect of decreased production upon commerce, industry, exchange and prices.

Long-Bell Options on \$1,700,000 Tract

Kelso, Wash.—Options have been secured by the Long-Bell Lumber company on timber holdings of the Milwaukee Land company, comprising 6000 acres in Lewis and Cowlitz counties. The tract is estimated to contain 400,000,000 feet and is valued at \$1,700,000.

Former Head of Klan is Arrested.

Atlanta, Ga.—Edward Young Clarke, ex-impertial wizard of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was arrested here on an indictment issued against him by the federal grand jury at Houston, Tex., charging violation of the Mann act. He was released on \$1000 bond.

Crisinger Federal Bank Head.

Washington, D. C.—The senate confirmed the nomination of D. R. Crisinger of Marlon, O., to be governor of the federal reserve board. He has been serving as comptroller of the currency.
