Dear Mr. Baker: Your protest to the Interstate Commerce Commission against the threatened dismemberment of the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific system was one of the factors which influenced the commission in deciding that the continuation of the present unified operation of these lines would be in the best public interest.

On behalf of the Southern Pacific company, its officers and employees I thank you and our many Tillamook friends for their support in this matter. One interesting fact developed during the Interstate Commerce commission hearing was that more than 100 carloads of cheese from Tillamook factories had been shipped dur-

ing the year over our lines to Angeles alone. This is only one example of the need for strong transportation lines locally within and between Pacific Coast states.

Please assure your members of our appreciation will take the form of continually improving service, directors, as you may know, have authorized the construction of the Iron cut-off. Work will be begun soon at the courts approve the commission's decision. In the meantime we have ordered \$40,000,000 worth of equipment for delivery this year which will enable us to effect improvements in our service.
