

**FINDS PRIMITIVE TRIBE**

**Strange People in Daghestan Think Americans Walk Upside Down.**

A tribe so primitive that it believes Americans live on the bottom of the world, and are therefore in darkness, has been found in the mountain villages of Daghestan by Dr. E. A. Golder of the Hoover foundation. These people, Dr. Golder said, upon his return here, think that Americans do their plowing while walking upside down with oxen to whose horns candles are tied. Believing that the world is table shaped, with themselves on its top, they feel that the Americans are indeed unfortunate because they are compelled to live in eternal night. Doctor Golder said that in many of the villages delegations greeted him as a man from the world below. Some were anxious to know how Americans managed to get about. One old graybeard, sorely perplexed by what seemed an unsolvable riddle, finally came to the conclusion that, inasmuch as Americans are a wonderful people, they have undoubtedly taken a lesson from the fly and learned to walk upside down. "They thought I arrived by way of a hole in the ground, the ladder to which is kept by the czar of Moscow," Doctor Golder asserted. These people still make fire with flint and steel and use stone hammers and shepherds' pipes. Justice is administered through trial by ordeal. The men, who are of remarkable physique, go about armed to the teeth, for they are feudists. The families live in stone huts in the practically railless mountains. Although the people are Moslems, the women are not veiled and because of the present shortage of cotton cloth, their only clothing consists of simple sheepskin coats. "They nearly overwhelmed me with hospitality," Doctor Golder said, "appointing as my special guard a young bandit, who had thirty-five otches in his warclub. He would of let me out of his sight." As a result of Doctor Golder's visit to this unfrequented region, the American Relief administration has sent rations for 10,000 children to the mountain villages, where starvation is general. William Driscoll has gone to Daghestan to take charge of the rations.

**Diamond in Throat Is Fatal to Little Girl**

Geneva—A Swiss dealer in precious stones named Dingler, while showing his five-year-old daughter some of his cases of jewels, was called to the telephone. When he returned he found the child choking. She had swallowed gems worth \$800. A doctor was hastily called, but the little girl was dead, having been strangled by a diamond which entered the throat. An operation was necessary to extract the stones from the child's throat and stomach.

**Misdemeanor to Feed Pigeons in Los Angeles**

Los Angeles, Cal.—Feeding pigeons in the downtown district will be a misdemeanor subject to a fine not exceeding \$500 or six months in the city jail when an ordinance passed by the city council becomes effective. The ordinance was passed to aid the park department in driving pigeons from Pershing square, a downtown park.

**Widow Holds Post 20 Days**

Victoria, B. C.—For 20 days after husband, the lighthouse keeper, died, Mrs. Thomas Watkins, alone her two children and the body, the light burning on Triple Island, jagged patch of rock off the swept coast of northern British Columbia. The woman's plight has reached civilization after a government lighthouse tender had visited the island on one of its regular trips.
