Believing that the world is table shaped, with themselves on its top, they feel that the Americans are indeed unfortunate because they are compelled to live in eternal night. the villages delegations greeted him as a man from the world below.

Some were anxious to know hew Americans managed to get about. One old graybeard, sorely perplexed by what seemed an unsolvable riddle. finally came to the conclusion that, inasmuch as Americans are a wonderful people, they have undoubtedly taken a lesson from the fly and learned to walk upside down.


"They thought I arrived by way of a hole in the ground the ladder to which is kept by the czar of Moscow," Doctor Golder asserted.
