WAR IS ANYTHING BUT HELL, SAYS YOUNG PA. MAN

Philadelphia, April 17.—"Sherman was wrong," Charles R. Speechley, Philadelphia World War veteran, told American Legion comrades, when he received word from France that he is heir to a fortune of \$250,000 there. Speechley accounted for his good fortune by saying that while in Paris during the war he rescued a young woman who had fallen off a bridge into the Seine.

DECORATION OF OVERSEAS GRAVES IS ENCOURAGED

Indianapolis, April 16.—Assurances of support of the American Legion in its campaign to raise a permanent endowment fund of \$100,000 to provide for the decoration of graves of war dead overseas each Memorial Day have been received from Myron T. Herrick, American ambassador to France, Secretary of War Weeks and General Pershing. "This delicate and kindly thought

of the American Legion in assuming the responsibility for the appropriate decoration of the graves of the American soldiers in France has received the universal and grateful approval of the families, relatives and friends of its dead comrades." Ambassador Herrick stated in a recent message to Legion national headquarters in Indianapolis. "It is an assurance of permanency and efficiency in the outward remembrance of our honored dead. Also, it is a comforting thought that the graves of our boys who sleep in the fields of France, where they fought and died, have become the sacred trust of their living comrades, the Legionnaires."

Secretary Weeks wrote that "the high and solemn purpose of this undertaking should command the material support of all patriotic Americans." General Pershing commends the movement to the "liberality of all those citizens who continue to cherish in their hearts a feeling of gratitude for the men whose lives were sacrificed in their behalf, and for the grandeur and prestige of America."
