MEALS SERVED BY RURAL SCHOOLS

Teachers in the small rural schools are serving hot lunches. Those who best find that it is well to be interested and co-operation of school board and parents before serving lunches. The cost of food is inexpensive. A cooking utensils, a two-burner stove and some towels are enough usually furnish their own bowls, and spoons. There are ways of obtaining the needed supplies for the warm noon meal. Some times the food is prepared by the school and the cost paid by the children. It is not that only one hot dish is prepared but that it is served freely in other food. By means of the school lunch children may learn the value of foods in the preparation of them and how to enjoy them. The cost of food is not to be neglected. The school lunch is a very important part of the child's life.

CHOOSING COLLEGE MEANS SUGGESTED

Principals and teachers of rural high schools should help the students that intend to continue their studies beyond high school, to select the college or university that seems best fitted for each individual student's needs. Out of the 105,000 boys and girls that are being graduated yearly from rural high schools, 45,000 intend to go on to normal school, college or university. Very often even though the student may know just what line of work he wishes to take up, he does not know what school to attend to get that work, selects a college because it is near, or he has a friend there, or some one from that college has canvassed the high school for pupils. These are not the best ways to decide a question that influences the entire trend of one's later life.

The rural high school can help in this. A list of the 1,040 normal schools, colleges, universities and professional schools giving the name, location and name and address of the president in each may be had free from the U. S. Bureau of Education, Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. Current catalogues are sent on request from most of the institutions so that a small library of 500 or 600 of them can easily be collected. With the help of a teacher or the class should learn to use the catalogues, write to registrars, etc. For rural high school children in the last half of the senior year, one period a week given to work of this kind should be well worth while.
