**MAIL MAN SCABS ON OLD SAINT NICK**

Twenty years ago, when the daily mail from North Yamhill to Tillamook was carried in the winter time by pack horses when bad roads were encountered all the way, and snow drifts and fallen timber were impediments on the summit of the Coast range, the mail contractors did not have the easy time that present day mail contractors have who slide over smooth surfaced roads in autos or who send their mail through on steam cars.

The other day J. A. Sampson of Garibaldi, recalled an experience he had on the day before Christmas, 1903 while in the employ of Grayson & Brown of the Trask house, contractors to deliver a daily mail between North Yamhill and Tillamook.

On the day before Christmas on the above year, the train mail on the West Side was late three hours, and Sampson left with six pack horses, heavily laden with mail sacks and covered with oil cloth protection to keep the sacks dry. In some way he overlooked his lantern, and while toiling toward the summit, darkness and a heavy rain overtook him. Sampson rode the lead horse and led the next pack horse which was followed by four more, linked together head and tail. Usually Sampson could look up through the heavy timber from the road and see the tree tops, but on this particular night, he could not see a foot ahead, and as if to further complicate matters, first one pack would slip and get loose, and then it was up to the packer to readjust it in the darkness. Later on he encountered snow, and there was more trouble. After many mishaps, however, he reached the Pat Doney cabin on the summit, and got a bite of bread and butter and a cup of coffee, and then secured a lantern and struck out for the Trask house, sixteen miles down the mountain. It was 2:30 in the morning when he arrived, and turned the mail and Santa Claus packages over to the men on the lower end of the route, and they rushed it on, making Tillamook about 10 a. m. on Christmas morning, thus delivering Santa Claus's presents and greetings to an eager and waiting population, and no doubt gladdening the heart of many a little child and as well as those of many adults, who little thought of the trials of the mail carrier who toiled under such difficulties nearly all night to get the mail through.

"I called it scabbing on Santa Claus said Sampson, and the thought of those expectant and waiting kids at the other end of the line, no doubt had its effect on my determination to get through at any cost, but I surely was about all in, when I got to the road house the next morning."

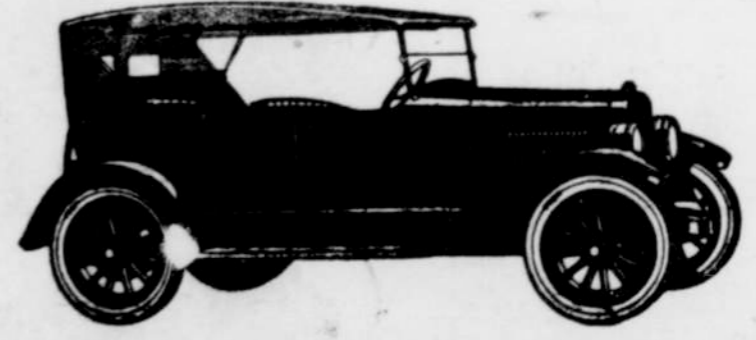
