NEW LAWS SOON EFFECTIVE

May 24th will be rather an important day in the history of the year as more than 250 laws passed by the last legislature will become effective on that date. The new prohibition laws, and the ones having to do with the enforcement of the narcotic drug statutes, and the law prohibiting the wearing of sectarian garbs in the public schools are important new laws, which will become of force on the 24th. Still another law is the one pro-

viding for the increase of from 2 to 3 cents in the tax on gasoline, which with the one cent tax on fuel, it is believed will raise quite a large revenue for the road building program of the state.
