MAY RIVAL NEWPORT BEACH

The fact that there are a number of pretty polished agates in the jewelers' shops in this city, brought out the fact that some very fine agates are being found on the Bayocean and Short Beach ocean front. It is said that some excellent water agates have been found, also ribbon, cloud, sardonyx and chalcedony specimens. At what is called the "big slide" between Bayocean and the light house, some beautiful amethyst crystals have been found, and it is believed that careful investigation will bring more of this semi-precious stones to light. Amethyst crystals have also been found in gold mining claims on Wilson river, in this county, some very pretty specimens being in the possession of Dr. Koch of this city, and others. It is possible that delving will uncover some fine agate beds along the beaches near to Tillamook which may rival the agate beds of Newport.
