MISUSE OF TERMS

"The word thoroughbred applies solely to a distinct breed of the horse family," said an authority in the court house one day this week to the reporter. "Purebred applies to cattle, but never the word thoroughbred. Many stockmen, as well as newspaper writers confuse the two terms. A pure bred cow is not a pure breed until registered, according to the rules governing associations. The progeny of one species of cow when crossed with a bull of another species, becomes a half-blood or half-breed, though both sire and dam may have been pure bred in their classes. Usually the progeny of two distinct types are called grades."
