Schofield and Ethel Pollock, both of Tillamook. MIGRATORY BIRDS ETC. Embert Wellg and Bernard Williams of this county were placed under arrest by U. S. Marshal Snow of Portland last Saturday charged with violation of the migratory bird law without other specification. The boys both live in this county and bonds in the sum of \$500 in each case were given for their appearance in the U. S. Circuit court at Portland, later on Geo. Williams and J. E. Williams were surety for Williams and M. F. Leach and E. P. Wells qualified for young Wells. The average boy has to be something of an ornithologist now days to know when he is violating the migratory bird law, and it is safe to say that about nine-tenths of the adult population, old and middle aged do not know. WATER COMMISSION MAKES IMPROVEMENTS The Tillamook water commission is making substantial improvements at the intake of the city's water supply on Killam creek, about six miles from this city. A new concrete dam is being constructed 75 feet across the creek, and a large settling tank is also being made with concrete bottom and sides together with a heavy wire screen at the intake to catch the leaves and other floatage that comes down the creek in the late fall, and during the winter. The work is under the direction of E. D. Hoag, the water superintendent, and additional work is that of the removal of the old 10 inch pipe and its replacement with a new 18 inch wood pipe main. The new pipe is being laid around the side of the hill, which will give a gradual fall, and thus overcome considerable friction and air bind which has created more or less trouble in the past. With the new changes finished the commission believes that a most satisfactory condition will result for the coming winter. The water should be absolutely pure and healthful as there are no farms or other sources of contamination on the creek above the intake of this mountain stream, which is the source of Tillamook's water supply.
