**ORDER**

That the open seasons as defined in Section 10, Chapter 153, of the General Laws of Oregon, 1921, for hunting, shooting, killing, taking and having in possession, alive or dead, the following named game ani-

mals and game birds respectively, in the State of Oregon, shall be as follows, to-wit:

The open season for deer with horns throughout the entire State shall be and is hereby declared to be from September 10th to October 31st of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Silver Gray squirrels in all sections of the state where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from September 15th to October 15th of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Chinese Pheasants and Bobwhite Quail in all sections of Game District No. 1, where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Chinese Pheasants in all sections of Game District No. 2, where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Third Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Quail in all sections of Game District No. 2 where there is an open season, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Third Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive, in Wasco County, and from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive, in Klamath county.

The open season on Mountain or Plummed Quail in all sections of Game District No. 1, where there is an open season, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive, in Douglas, Josephine, Coos and Curry Counties; and from the Second Sunday in October to the Second Sunday in November of each year, both dates inclusive, in Jackson County.

The open season on California Valley Quail in all sections of Game District No. 1, where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Fourth Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive, in Douglas, Josephine, Coos and Curry Counties; and from the Second Sunday in October to the Second Sunday in November of each year, both dates inclusive, in Jackson County.

The open season on Blue or Sooty Grouse, Ruffed Grouse or Native Pheasants in all sections of the state where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from September 10th to October 31st of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Sage Hens in all sections of the State where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be from August 1st to August 15th of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Hungarian Partridges in Umatilla County shall be and is hereby declared to be from the Second Sunday in October to the Third Sunday in October of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season on Prairie Chickens in all sections of the State where there is an open season therefor, shall be and is hereby declared to be closed.

Notice is also hereby given that the changes in the open seasons made by this Order in nowise affect the bag limits or other regulations provided by law respecting the hunting, shooting, killing, taking or having in possession, alive or dead, of such game animals and game birds.

**FRENCH FORTS PLACED ON SALE AS VILLAS**

**Strongholds Along Riviera Offered as Summer Abodes.**

Paris—Anyone who wants to buy or rent a nice Vauban fortress along the French Riviera can apply to engineers' headquarters, French army, a new French real estate firm. The army owns the choicest sites along the Mediterranean coast, from which the most beautiful views of the rocky, tropical, indented shore line and azure sky and water can be enjoyed. Gorgeous sunsets are guaranteed.

The buildings themselves are safely built with ten to twenty-foot-thick masonry walls, and will last several lifetimes. They are made to insure nervous tenants against shells and bombs, and even meteors. Their chief charm is a cooling dampness, greatly appreciated in summer. Clatern water with every fort—if it rains. Land and four walls go with the sale, and occupants are allowed to put in doors, windows, modern conveniences and furniture—at their own expense.

Such is the attractive offer made to the public, because the French army never realizes that these marine forts never again can be used for military purposes. Before the war all of these forts were manned and equipped to protect the French coasts, but every man and every cannon was sent to the western front during the war. For nine years they have been lying idle and falling to pieces.

Progress in armaments, the evolution of war, the greater potency and caliber of cannons have made it evident that they are obsolete. All along the Mediterranean, almost every cape, every hill and every island, is crowned with a gray squat mass of stone and concrete. Not only are the trenches and moats now filled with plants of every description, but the profusion of nature has even been extended to the walls of the buildings, inside and out. It would have cost enormous sums to give these fortresses a modern efficiency, and the cost of their destruction would be great. So the army decided to rent or sell them.

**Two-Thirds of Detroit Workers in Auto Plants**

Detroit, Mich.—Half the industrial employees in Detroit in 1914 were employed in the automobile or allied industries.

Today approximately two-thirds of the industrial employees here are working either in automobile plants or in factories closely allied to the automotive industry.

Officials of the Detroit board of commerce make the announcement to show the rapid growth of the automobile industry. During the period the population of Detroit has more than doubled.

In 1914 Detroit had a total of 112,483 industrial employees, of whom about 66,000 worked in automobile or accessory plants. Today the city has approximately 320,000 industrial workers, and of these about 205,000 are employed either in automobile plants or in establishments where parts of

motocars or motors are produced. The number of automobiles made in Michigan every year is about 80 per cent of the total output of the country.

**Offers Bill to End Peerages in England**

London.—Arthur Ponsonby, laborite member of parliament from Sheffield and himself of aristocratic lineage, introduced a bill in the house of commons designed to terminate hereditary titles. The bill would enable present peers to renounce their titles and would bar heirs and heiresses to titles born after the passage of the bill from succeeding to the titles.

**Killed Recovering Ball for Girl.**  
Seattle, Wash.—Catalina Tarantani, twenty-one years old, bell boy at the Hotel Sorrento here, was killed when he went down an elevator shaft to recover a ball for Suzanne Reid, little daughter of Judge George T. Reid, vice-president of the Northern Pacific railway.

**Holland Is Getting Rattlers from Idaho**

Ontario, Ore.—Idaho rattlesnakes are being shipped to Holland where they will engage in the manufacture of a serum for the benefit of the human race, the enemy of all snake-doms.

Robert Limbert, of Boise, has shipped 47 rattlers to Amsterdam, Holland, where they will be used by the Dutch government in experimental work, chiefly in the development of a serum calculated to provide a cure for rheumatism. The snakes were captured in an hour and a quarter at Black's creek, 12 miles from Boise, on the Mountain Home highway. They range from 10 to 30 inches in length.

**Heiress to Estate Must Wed 2-Generation Yank**

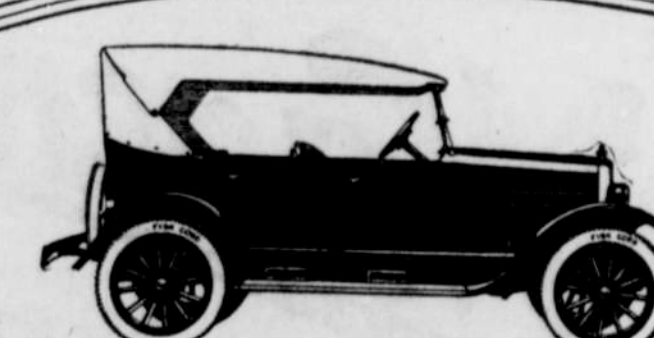
Denver, Colo.—A bequest of the greater part of the residuary estate of Gen. Frank D. Total assets of the estate are estimated at slightly more than \$20,000, one-half of which is left outright to the widow.
