TILLAMOOK COW HAS 3RD RECORD

Mawes Pretty Lady Gets Recognition In Three Different Classes

PUT ON EXHIBITION

Visitors Show Interest In Cow Which Has Made Three World's Records

Mawes Pretty Lady, the fine cow owned by Lester C. Daniels of Daniel's Jersey Farm north of Tillamook, is the world's record holder in three different classes. She is famous. Pretty Lady still holds the world's record as a senior year-old, with 824 pounds of butter in 365 days. She finished the record and became fresh again started on another test as Junior year-old making 828 pounds of fat in 365 days. After producing the record amount of fat for champion honors, on July 1st, Pretty Lady produced a living calf which completed requirements for a 305 day official testing. On the third of July, Mr. Daniels notified the American Jersey Cattle club of New York of the event, and on the same day received the following wire in reply:

Lady National Junior four and all champion. Congratulations." This makes Pretty Lady a three-time champion cow, a record, it is believed, not held by a cow of any age in the world. Pretty Lady has won a gold and a silver medal in the senior 2-year-old test, and a gold medal of merit and a gold and silver medal for the last test, making in all five medals earned. She has produced four living calves and is a year past 5 years old, which proves her to be a re-producer as well as a producer. Mr. Daniels believes that Mawes Pretty Lady is doing as well as ever. She has had much to do with reproducing power as she has not only so heartily as the average cow, but consumes a larger quantity of concentrated feeds. Day and night she keeps her healthful and she does not require so much of the grain as that burn up the vitality of the cow, when fed largely on that diet. Mr. Daniels owns Lady's mother and grandmother also her daughter and granddaughter. Also four sisters of Lady's dam running from a year to 12 years of age. During her last test (Continued on Page 8)

TILLAMOOK CHEESE DEFENDED BY OWNER

Portland Dealer Routs Rough Robbers And Saves Prize Produce From Tillamook

It is generally conceded that Tillamook cheese is popular, and that it is also in great demand, but the following story taken from a Seattle paper dated July 1st, shows that when cheese burglars come into a store and seek to carry it away in broad daylight, despite the efforts of the proprietor, it's fame is broad spread. Here is the story:

"H. L. Klock, 55 years old, proprietor of a butter and cheese house at 914 Western Ave., about 10:30 o'clock this morning successfully defended himself and a Tillamook cheese in a battle with two young men who sought to carry away the cheese. Although he sustained minor bruises in the battle, Mr. Klock's fighting spirit resulted in the arrest of V. P. Gill, 24, and R. W. Dally, 22 who were held at the city jail for investigation.

"Mr. Klock was unloading a carload of cheese he told the officers, when he saw the young men approach the car. One of them picked up a cheese and started to run away, but Mr. Klock was too quick and sprang at him. He was knocked down, he told the police, but he held fast to his assailant and they rolled over on the pavement. Mr. Klock says he was then attacked by the other young man and the three were battling furiously when Patrolmen J. Yosting and J. H. Hurt arrived as reinforcements, summoned by Klock's office crew."

NEW SCHOOL BUILDING TAKING SHAPE FAST

The new school house is assuming shape, and work is progressing at a satisfactory rate, say the directors. The roof is nearly all on, and lathing and plastering are going ahead at the present time. STOLEN AUTOMOBILE IS FOUND AT BEACH

Friday last the sheriff of this county found the machine where it had been abandoned at Rockaway beach. Two young men were seen to get out of the car at the beach and walk away. The owner of the car was notified and came in and got his property Saturday.

GARIBALDI RESIDENT CHARGED WITH CRIME

John Markland, who is past 21 years of age, was arrested in Portland on the 3rd inst. in Portland and later brought to this county by agents of the Sheriff's office, where he now lies in jail, charged with the crime of contributing to the delinquency of one, Dolly Derby, of Garibaldi, whose age is given as 16 years. It is said that Markland accompanied the girl to Portland where they were apprehended. The man in default of bail, is being held subject to the action of the grand jury.

Since the above was put in type Markland and Miss Derby were married by Justice Stanley in this city, and Markland was released from custody being out on his own recognizance.

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS VISIT THE COUNTY

Brighton-Jetty Creek Road Viewed By Commission On Recent Trip

CROSSINGS CONSIDERED

Beach Road Expected To Be Rushed As Result Of Inspection Made Last Week

On Sunday last Tillamook county was visited by two of the new state highway commission Wm. Doby and W. H. Malone, Commissioner Van Duzer, not being present. The commissioners were given a dinner at the Lake Lytle hotel and about twenty-five citizens of Tillamook, Garibaldi, Brighton and Wheeler were present. After dinner, the commissioners walked over the uncompleted gap in the coast road between Brighton and Jetty creek a distance of less than a mile. At the dinner, the commissioners stated that it would be a part of their policy to complete the work on this road as outlined by their predecessors. It is expected that the public service commission will act as a sort of arbitrator of the differences, if any, between the highway commission and the railroad, regarding crossings. From what was said at the dinner, it is inferred that the new commission will push the matter of the completion of the gap between Brighton and Jetty creek.

The question of the crossings at Bay City, Miami, Barview and Watsoke spoken of, and it was learned that the matter had been taken up with the state public service commission who will decide what shall be done by both the state and the railroad company.

While in the north end of the county, the party examined into the conditions of the highway between the Clatsop county line and Mohler, and after leaving Lake Lytle, left for a tour of the southern part of the county. With the two commissioners were state engineer Roy A. Klein and district engineer Clark. It is believed that as a result of the visit of the state officials the state highway via Garibaldi and Brighton, known as the beach road, will be completed in the near future.

CHURCH WORKERS BRING HOME BANNER

Convention Prize Is Won By Local Congregation For Increase Of Membership

The Tillamook Christian church captured the banner for the largest increase of church membership according to town population during the past year, the new members numbering 132. The banner will be displayed in the local church and the church delegates at the recent yearly meeting at Turner received many congratulations. The state convention of Christian churches of Oregon began on the last day of June and ended July 9th. This church had the largest delegation present at the convention, there being about 40 delegates and church members from this county. For 40 years past the state convention has met in the tabernacle at Turner which seats between 5000 and 6000 people. There were 1200 delegates who camped on the shady and spacious grounds near the little Marion county town. The convention was presided over by C. F. Swander of Portland who is the state secretary. JUNE CIRCUIT COURT HOLDS SHORT TERM

Four Cases Disposed Of In Two Day Court Session

FISHING CASE IS CLOSED

Some Of The Cases Are Postponed Until September Upon Adjournment

Judge Geo. R. Bagley held court here on June 5th and adjourned the morning of June 6th. The following proceedings were had:

In the matter of Mary Webber Mills vs. J. Kodad and wife; suit to foreclose on a mortgage; argued and submitted; case taken under advisement.

A. O. Jackson and wife vs. The New York Life Insurance Co.; suit to collect on life policy held by Wayne Jackson, since deceased; the policy was for \$5,000 with a double indemnity for accident; on motion the case was allowed to be taken to Portland for trial.

W. E. Makinster vs. Chessell Mills and A. B. Schoonover; suit to enjoin the defendant from interfering with the nets of the plaintiff on Wilson river; the court allowed the injunction to stand and also granted an injunction in favor of the defendant; the court advised that both sides fish without interference with each other.

Maggie M. Knudson vs. Carl P. Knudson; decree of divorce as asked for by the plaintiff.

Some cases were set for trial on Sept. 4, and court adjourned on the 6th inst.

NEW WATER MAIN PIPE IS FAST BEING LAID

Supt. E. D. Hoag of the Tillamook Water commission has begun laying the new pipe from the intake down the line a distance of about one and a half miles. Part of the new pipe has been delivered and the remainder is coming along from Portland. Bad, muddy conditions have retarded the work considerably of late due to the heavy rains, but with some dry weather to help, the work will soon be done. It is thought the force will be able to lay from 300 to 400 feet of pipe per day.

WHY NOT ADVERTISE TILLAMOOK COUNTY?

Automobile Caravan Starts For Tour Of Southern Oregon To Help Create Better Spirit

The "Boost for Oregon" caravan will leave Portland July 16th for a trip over the Pacific highway, Roseburg-Coos Bay highway, into Marshfield with a side trip to the Oregon caves. The Oregon State Motor association in a letter to Rollie Watson asks him to take up the matter with Tillamook civic clubs and have them enter one or more cars representing Tillamook county. Cars should bear banners setting forth the resources of their county. "It is believed," states the letter, "that the result of the trip will be to create a much needed 'Boost for Oregon' spirit, and that it will give the boosters a chance to do some good work for the Roosevelt highway." Mr. Watson wants to know why the beach proprietors and other interests cannot take advantage of this caravan trip to advertise Tillamook county and its varied resources. Mr. Watson will join the caravan himself, but he wants others to show the same public spirit, and co-operate with him in the matter. Here is a chance to do some good work for our beaches and induce tourists of the state and elsewhere to come over here and see our country. Let's enlarge the Tillamook spirit.

GEORGE COATES HURT BY GAS EXPLOSION

Geo. Coates, son of A. F. Coates of the Coates Lumber Co., of this city was severely burned last Tuesday morning at the Coates Driving & Boom company's camp, by the explosion of a can of gasoline. His face and one hand suffered by the backfire of the explosion and he was brought to the Boals hospital where his injuries were attended to. While quite painful his wounds are not serious.

CYRUS RANDALL IS GORED BY BULL

Cyrus Randall, a well known dairyman of east of town narrowly escaped death from the savage onslaught of a Jersey bull last Tuesday morning and now lies in a local hospital suffering from his wounds. Mr. Randall went into the bull's pen to take it out of the barn, when without warning he was viciously attacked by the animal. He was thrown to the floor and received severe contusions and surface wounds when he grabbed the bull by the horns and in turn was thrown clear of the pen alighting on the barn floor. His escape was almost miraculous after the fight and brot to town. The bull had never shown vicious tendencies before. It is understood that Mr. Randall will recover as there were no internal injuries.

SON OF E. S. WRIGHT INJURED BY MACHINE

Leland Wright, the 8 year old son of E. S. Wright, the first street furniture dealer, was knocked over and suffered some skin abrasions on one leg Thursday night by an automobile coming west on 3rd avenue. The boy had one foot in a small express wagon, and was pushing it along the street with the other foot, when the auto struck the little wagon and overturned it, carrying it a few feet. The auto wheels did not run over the boy and he was not much injured. The machine belonged to Harry Fletcher and was driven by Eugene Hester. The boy was attempting to cross the street and evidently did not see the auto approaching. The auto was driven slowly and the driver stated that he did all he could to avoid the accident.

TILLAMOOK FAIR PLANS MATURING

Infantry Will Give Attack Demonstration During Week Of Fair

NOW TIME TO PREPARE

Money Not Available For Completion Of New Fair Grounds Purchased Some Time Ago

Secretary Pine states that the outlook for a good fair was never better. There is every indication that the stock exhibit will be fully up to that of previous fairs, and it is hoped that it will be larger and better. Free motion pictures will be given on three nights of the fair week, and something new will be the attack demonstration by infantry units of company K, O. N. G. This will be worth seeing and will give the onlookers an idea of modern military in action.

The business men of the county have been rather slow in making reservations for business exhibits. This is a big attraction to most people, and it is sincerely hoped by the management that the business men will be thoroughly represented at this session of the fair. This is the time to begin to get ready, and the public should assist in this way to make the fair a success. The fair belongs to Tillamook county and as usual there will be a large number of strangers here, who naturally will want to see an exhibit by the leading business men of the county. Several people have lately inquired when the new fair grounds would be occupied. The county now owns 100 acres a short distance from the present grounds, and it is paid for, but there is no money in the county coffers available for the expense of new buildings, and that is the reason. Before these grounds can be used, there must be a fund for the above purpose and about the only way to get it, is to levy a tax for the purpose and that will be up to the people. The present grounds are leased from year to year from the Southern Pacific company and an order from that Company to vacate would have to be obeyed at the end of any contract year.

TARGET PRACTICE NOW AUTHORIZED

Capt. Shearer has received authority to put on target practice for the benefit of Company K. The company already has the grounds, which are located on land belonging to Geo. B. Lamb and Clyde Clements, 5 1/2 miles out south on the highway. Capt. Shearer states that practice will be had at least once a week during the summer and fall months. The company demonstrated at Camp Lewis that it has some good marksmen. The big national shootfest will take place sometime next fall in Virginia, and it is intended to give the boys of the company a chance to qualify for that important event, and Company K will have a chance to be represented by one or more marksmen, should they show the required skill.

SCHOONER "SILETZ" ARRIVES SATURDAY

The oil burner schooner Siletz of Newport and hailing from that port arrived here and tied up at the Lamb & Schrader dock Saturday forenoon. She came up to get a 150 ton cargo of 18 and 36 inch concrete culvert pipe to be used on the Roosevelt highway near Devil's lake. The Siletz is a partially finished coaster and brot up a large barge upon which the pipe was to be conveyed to Siletz bay, that being the point nearest to the road where the culvert pipe is to be used. The barge was loaded with 150 tons, and that with a former shipment of 50 tons will complete the contract taken by A. T. Dolan of this city. The Siletz was commanded by Capt. Cassidy and left out Monday evening at high tide.
