## ARMY MASK HAS **NEW FEATURES**

Makes It Possible for Officers to Give Orders in Battle Without Removal.

Washington. - The chemical warfare service of the army has developed a new gas mask so constructed as to enable the wearer to carry on conversation while using it and thus naking it possible for officers to give orders in battle without removing it. Such a mask will be of vital imporance in troop operations, and the incention of the speaking device in this new type of mask is regarded by army experts as the greatest improvement in gas masks since the close of the World war. They regard it as the nost nearly perfect device of its kind

Wearer Can Talk.

The new mask has a sort of diaphragm attachment somewhat similar in appearance to that used on phonographs. The new mask likewise contains a device for passing dry air from the chemicals over he eyeglasses of the mask. This prevents collection of moisture and considerably improves the vision. 


