

**TILLAMOOK PIONEER
RECALLS OLD EVENTS**

It used to be a state saying that "all the great men of the state got their start in Yamhill." While that county has produced a number of men of note, other counties have also furnished a respectable quota. John U. Smith, who has lived practically all of his life thus far in old Yamhill, was in the city Thursday on his way with his family to spend a few days near Barview, where he has a summer camp ground of his own. It is the remnant of 5 acres bought by his father in the Sixties and a share of it fell to J. U. Hither he comes every summer and camps under the shade of a big cherry tree where he can gaze out at the ocean or sweep the bay with his hazel eyes. John U. is one of Yamhill's well to do farmers and stockmen, and has one of the finest herds of Ayrshires in the state. He also is the secretary of the Ayrshire Breeders association which includes the states of Oregon, and Washington and British Columbia; and in the meantime he finds time to study economic questions, and incidentally to indulge his penchant for humor for John U. is a humorist by nature and usually sees the funny side of life first but that does not interfere with business calculations and real work.

"Along about 1867 my father and mother came over the trail from Yamhill to Tillamook and I have heard them say that the trip occupied four days. They took their time and camped along the road and enjoyed the trip. It was then that my father bought the tract above mentioned, and while they were over here, I was born. Yes sir, I am a native born Tillamooker, and am proud of it. Just why I was born here, I don't know, but I guess it was because it was to be. Anyway I have always had a warm feeling in my heart for old Tillamook. But the most of my life thus far has been spent in Yamhill. While my mother was alive, and when I was in the Hawaiian Islands, I received a letter from my mother stating that the P. R. & N. Co. which was then building to Tillamook, wanted me to deed right of way for the road down near Barview. I had a lot in the road and the company wanted to get through. Just how I got that lot is a story of itself. When I was about 20 years of age, I attended college at Forest Grove, and was pitcher for the local base ball club and had learned to throw curved balls. One day I was accosted by D. D. Bailey, well known to the old time Tillamookers. He was then living at Forest Grove and asked me "what I was doing." I said: "I am going to school and pitching curved ball for the college team." Mr. Bailey at once challenged the statement that I or anyone else could throw a base ball and cause it to curve from a straight line. "Prove it to me," said Mr. Bailey, "and I will give you a deed to a lot over in a naddition I have over on the Tillamook beach." I proceeded to demonstrate and won the lot, but as I was not of age, the deed was made to my mother. When I got mother's letter, I told her to deed the right of way to the company. She did so and received a box of candy from the right of way man. That's all.

A few years ago, I thought I would see if there was any of that lot left. I came over to Tillamook and searched the records and found that what

the right of way folks had not taken was now a part of the Roosevelt highway. The county had used it for road purposes; and then I lost interest in that lot."

it was hard to find parking space. During the bathing hour the surf was filled with happy bathers while others enjoyed driving on the beach or making the drive to the top of Maxwell Point.

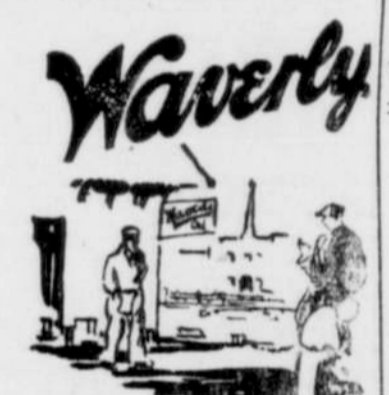
Edgar F. Allen and wife of Portland are in the Eyrie for a weeks stay. Mr. Allen is deputy grand master of the A. O. U. W.
