

LAKES ARE STOCKED BY 40 CANS OF FRY

Geo. Russell, deputy fish and game warden shipped forty cans of fish to Lake Lytle last Monday morning a few cans going to Lake Carnahan, near Astoria. The fish shipped were Eastern brook trout and were from an inch to two inches long. These are high altitude fish and seem to thrive best in the snow fed lakes of the Cascades than anywhere else in Oregon, where they attain to a large size, and are gamey. They will be tried out in Lake Lytle and other lakes in the county. The transfer was in charge of T. J. Craig of Portland, who attends to the work of transferring the fish. A big truck owned by the state was used. The eggs shipped in from a Cascades lake were hatched at the Gold Creek hatchery.

TRASK ROAD PROBABLE

Tillamook beaches. Naturally, as the Headlight has before said, Portland will be interested in securing the shortest route to the tidewater and to a junction with the coming Roosevelt highway. It is believed that the Trask cut off route, if the right grade can be had, will solve the problem of quick auto transit to the Pacific beach. With only about 75 miles intervening between Tillamook city and Portland on a due east and west course the value of this road should be apparent to all. Should travel from Portland to the Roosevelt highway be routed over the Yamhill-Tillamook highway, it will not only add many more miles, but the Roosevelt highway will be

contacted at a point some distance to the south of Tillamook and most of the eastern tourist travel would then go south without seeing the Tillamook valley or its town or beaches. But the chief value would be, after all said, in securing a short drive to this city from Portland and the proposed Trask cut off seems to hold the greatest possibilities. It is believed that the Tillamook county court is entirely favorable to this cut off, provided the survey will shorten the present distance to the metropolis with consistent grades.

If the survey shall be found practicable then Tillamook should get behind the project and boost. It is assumed that Washington county will do the same thing; and in that case, there is every reason to believe that Portland also will assist, with the result that the state highway commission will find a strong public opinion pressure for its participation.

Recent information is that the Hobbs survey party is making good progress on the Wilson river survey and that within a few weeks may be found at work on the new route from Cherry Grove westward to a junction with the old Trask road.

CHEESE MEETING HELD

over the cooler invariably shows gassy texture as the milk seemed to take on taints from its surroundings and in nearly every case it was found

that the dairymen did not keep the coolers in good condition. Also the milk coolers were seldom kept in a sanitary place.

"I think a great deal of the trouble Tillamook county has been experiencing this season with milking machine milk would be done away with if the night's milk was invariably cooled. Experiments have shown that milk will cool twenty-one times faster when set in water of a certain temperature than if left in the atmosphere of like temperature. You will readily see what this means to milking machine milk which naturally has a temperature of from ten to fifteen degrees higher than milk usually milked by hand. The milking machine milk carries much more animal and unless this is taken out immediately the milk is tainted beyond repair.

"I hope that your association will seriously consider the proposition of cooling all evening's milk which may be milked by milking machines as that is the only manner by which you are going to be able to eliminate the trouble that you have had this season.

"I notice in many places that dairymen have water available but for some reason do not connect the cooling tanks with the running water. In one instance all that was necessary was to turn on the faucet. I wish you would place before your directors the seems that milking machines are being placed in faster than ever before and I feel for the reputation of Tillamook cheese.

"Generally I found the factories in fairly good sanitary condition and

with the exception of one I have no criticism to make. I wish to compliment you and your dairymen on the uniformly good condition in which I found the milk houses, milk cans and other utensils. This shows that you and the factories generally have had great co-operation from the farmers of Tillamook county. The only proposition is that too many farmers are still of the opinion that the milking machines are simply labor saving devices and no special effort needs to be put forth to keep them in cleanly condition.

"Trusting that you will be able to eliminate the trouble by carrying out the foregoing suggestions, I am yours truly, L. B. Zemer."

After considerable discussion the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, there has been considerable trouble in the various factories in this county due to milk having been delivered which showed flavors and whereas it is the consensus of opinion that most of this trouble is due to the fact that many are not cooling the night's milk of the milking machine milk,

"Now therefore, it is urgently recommended that all factories insist that all night's milk be thoroughly cooled before the same is accepted by such factory."

The secretary reported on the feed situation and stated that new price cards had been sent out as of this date in which the principle changes were: \$1 decline in oats, corn and barley, mill run prices off the cars \$29 and \$30 out of warehouse, and the price of Linseed Oil Meal was reduced to \$52 per ton or \$2.65 a sack and that wheat prices had been reduced to 2 1-4c per pound. It was also stated that patrons desiring same could have wheat, corn and barley for the same price as oats, corn and barley. Hay prices were given as follows: Oats and vetch hay \$19 and \$20, alfalfa hay \$21 and \$22.

Secretary Haberlach reported that the cheese market was only in fair shape and that while the current market is still 27c considerable storage cheese had been sold for less money as he thought it best to do this rather

than have the association to store so early in the season. The directors present expressed themselves as being of the same opinion.

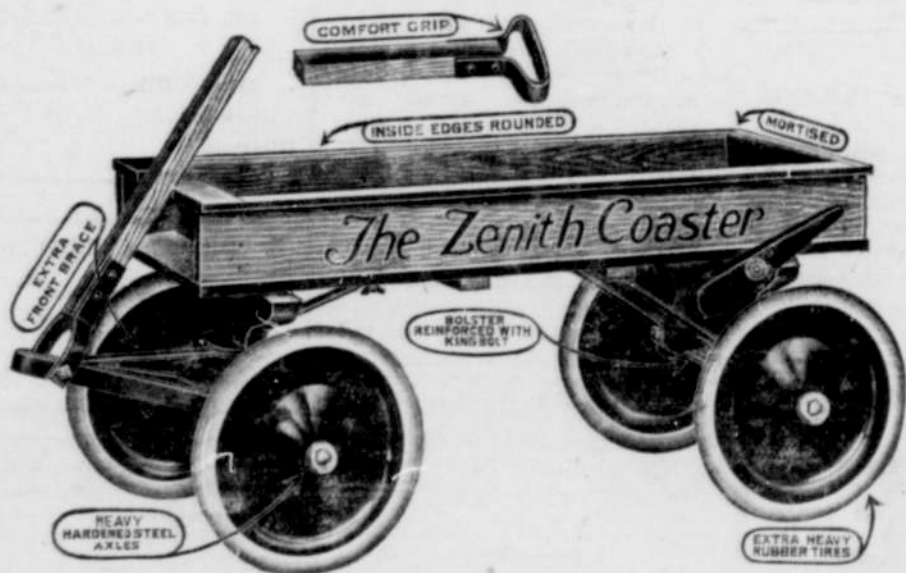

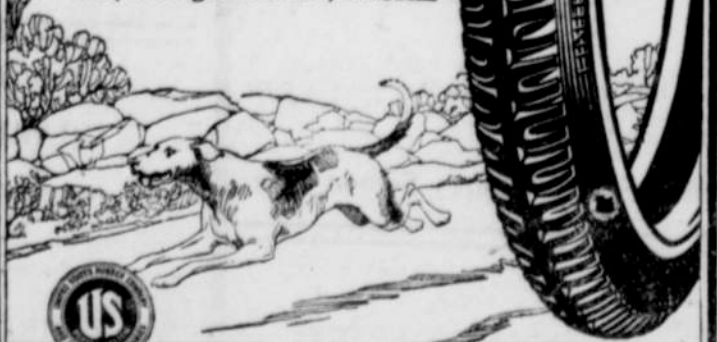
