**EARTH'S SURFACE ADRIFT, BELIEF OF SCIENTISTS**

**Theories of German Savant Arouse New Controversy.**

London.—An interesting controversy has been excited in British scientific circles by the remarkable theories of Prof. Alfred Wegener, a German, who declares that the earth's continents are drifting westward. His thesis is that the earth's continents are of lighter

material, and float like icebergs on a heavier plastic material, which reaches its highest level at the bottom of the oceans.

This startling theory has been strongly criticized by P. Lake of the Royal Geographical society. By means of maps he showed the way in which Wegener has reconstructed the land surface of the globe. According to his reconstruction North America was once in physical contact with Europe; India fitted in between Africa and Australia and South America was brought into contact with Africa. Since then the

continents have drifted away from one another into their present position.

Among a number of carefully reasoned criticisms, Mr. Lake pointed out that in order to meet his theory Wegener had flattened out the Himalayas in order to lengthen the peninsula of India, but he had not flattened out others of the world's mountains in a similar way. He also declared that the argument based on alleged correspondence in geological formation in the various continents would not hold good, because Wegener's geological facts were not accurate.

As an offset to Mr. Lake's views, a number of other British observers seem inclined to support Wegener's revolutionary theory.

Prof. J. Jolly of Trinity college, Dublin, writing in the current issue of Nature, thinks that Wegener is in error in working out the theory on the basis of a westerly drift of the continents. The theory, he says, grows in probability if an easterly drift is indicated.

**British Homes Happy, Say Divorce Figures**

London.—Domestic felicity is steadily gaining strength in England and Wales, if recently published statistics regarding divorce may be taken as a criterion. During 1921 the number of divorces in these countries declined by 35 per cent. In the previous year matrimonial suits showed an increase of 35 per cent over the pre-war totals.

In recent years additional legal facilities have been accorded to poor persons seeking divorce in England, and this has brought a large increase in the number of cases. During the last nine years 24,900 matrimonial suits were filed. Of the 3,464 suits entered in 1921, 1,702 petitions were filed by husbands and 1,750 by wives. In 95 per cent of the cases the petitioners were successful.

Of the parties concerned in the total number of suits for the year under survey 3,282 were bachelors and 8,881 were spinsters at the date of the marriage, but by far the greater proportion were married at ages between 21 and 30. The proportion of childless marriages was high, reaching a total of nearly 2,000.

Professional men head the list in the number of divorces, with 1,148 cases, while the clergy is at the bottom of the table, with only six. Army officers, soldiers and sailors figured in 341 cases, actors in 108, physicians in 79, schoolmasters in 18 and journalists in 15.

**Village Bars Domino Games on Sundays**

Dunbar, W. Va.—Blue laws of ultra-marine hue are being enforced in this municipality. The policy of the administration is keep the lid down tight. Somebody slipped over the line of demarcation the other Sunday and played dominos. News of the crime reached the ears of Mayor R. H. Garrett, and he forthwith caused the following notice to be published in the Dunbar Advance:

"Must close Sunday!  
"Notice is hereby given that the playing of dominoes in any public place in Dunbar on Sunday will not be permitted after this date. B. H. Garrett, mayor."

**Gets \$1,000 to Repay \$51 Loan Made in 1912**

Hornell, N. Y.—Edward Congdon, Erie train despatcher, has received a draft for \$1,000 in payment of a loan of \$51 in 1912. Congdon and Jake Griffin of Omaha had been friends in Japan. They met later in San Francisco, where Griffin was broke. Congdon bought him a ticket to Omaha and gave him money besides. Griffin promised to repay. Congdon got a letter from an Omaha lawyer saying \$1,000 had been deposited to his credit by Griffin.

The following is from one of the Coos bay papers where Mr. Wilson recently staged four shows:

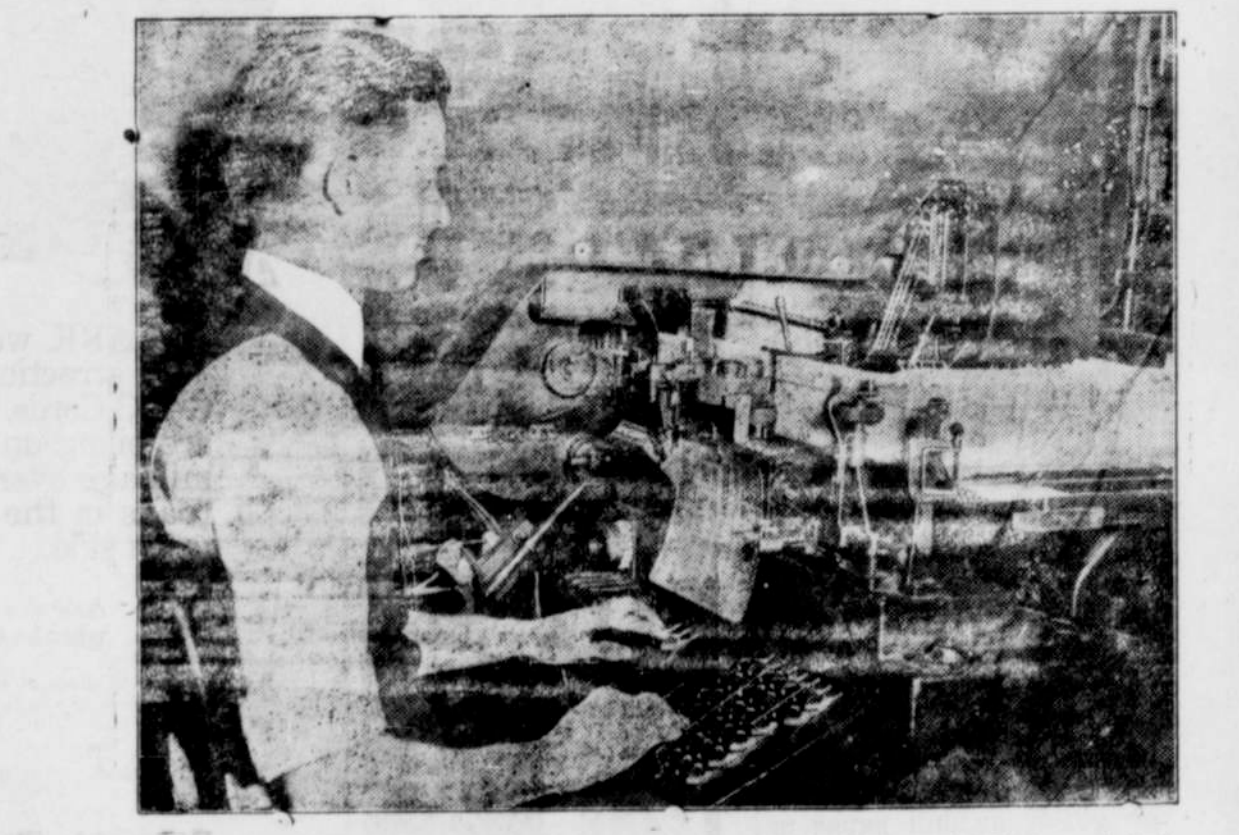
"The direction of a Gilbert & Sullivan opera requires not only the ability to sing and act the various roles of the piece, but a knowledge of the traditional manner in which each selection is sung and acted, the manner of speaking the lines and the many little pieces of stage "business" that add to the interpretation. He must be able to impart this knowledge to others and by precept and example assist each member of the cast in voice

training, enunciation, elocution, gesture dancing and characterization.

"It is only through these methods that a producer can coach amateurs until the result approaches that of a professional performance.

"Added to the artistic rendering of the music and lines and the direction of the orchestra he must provide correct and adequate costuming and scenery, and be able to so conduct the business end of the show that a financial as well as artistic success is secured.

"That Mr. Wilson possesses these qualifications has been amply proven in the Coos bay country. In 1910 he produced a Minstrel Show for the Marshfield Elks and in 1916 "The Mikado" for the same organization. The opera at that time had three renderings in the Noble Theatre and one at Coquille. In the past three months he has produced the comic opera "The Merry Dairymaids" for the Three Link Club of North Bend and for the Bandon Concert Band, of Bandon and a Minstrel show for the American Legion of Marshfield."

**NEW LETTER SORTING DEVICE SPEEDS DISPATCH OF MAIL**

What is it? A new mechanical contrivance designed to insure an early dispatch of mail has been installed by the Washington Post Office. No hand sorting of mail any longer. Five men at keyboards like this one operate the machine like a linotype machine and by the pressure of two keys on the keyboard each letter in front of the operator is sent on its way to a particular cell or compartment, leaving before him the next letter in the stack. Thus mail for various states and cities is segregated with practically no handling.
