

MRS. NELLIE ALLEN

Mrs. Nellie Allen was born in Norway, October 9, 1846 and departed from this life August 9, 1923 being 76 years 10 months of age.

At two years of age she left with her parents for Sweden where she resided until 18 years of age. She then came to America and reached Kansas City, Kansas, in 1868, it taking eight days at that time from New York to Kansas City.

On November 5, 1870, at Junction City Kansas she married J. P. Allen who passed away May 12, 1912. For some time they lived on a homestead near Morganville, Kan., then moved to Denver, Colo., where they engaged in the grocery business until 1886 and from there going to Redwood City, California to engage in the Feed mill business. After a year's residence at Redwood City, they removed to Oakland, California, for a year. It was here a party of six men, J. P. Allen included, was formed to come to Oregon to look for a new home.

They came on a lumber schooner to Hobsonville, Ore., and the parties located on homesteads on Killam creek. The families were sent for and Mrs. Allen arrived here April 8, 1888, after living on this homestead the required length of time they moved to Tillamook. They took charge of the Grand Central hotel which was a block north of the Thayer bank building where they were burned out in 1893. From this date till July 1912, Mrs. Allen was actively engaged in the hotel business. In this period of years her best efforts were given to the comforts of those far and near and every one felt the Allen House a home. She will be remembered lovingly by those who came to Tillamook years ago by always having a cheerful fire and a warm cup of coffee for those arriving over the mountains regardless of the hour of night. To the traveling men as well as many others she was always known as Mother Allen. Her dominant trait was charity, no one was ever turned away without a meal because they were without funds.

The past eleven years she has lived in her home on Fifth street surrounded by her children, grandchildren and a host of friends who never forgot to come and see her and always found a cheerful welcome. She was a devout Christian implicitly believing in God. Her often expressed sentences were: "In God we live and move and have our being," the other one was: "What God cannot do no man need attempt." It was in this faith she slept peacefully away August 9, 1923.

She left to mourn her loss a daughter, Mrs. J. C. Holden, a son Dr. E. D. Allen, granddaughters, LaVerna Holden and Barbara Jean Allen, grandson Junior Holden, a sister Mrs. Ida Strumat, Morganville, Kansas, seventeen nieces, seven nephews besides the many enduring friends.

Funeral services were held at Henkle's undertaking parlors Saturday afternoon at 2 p. m. conducted by Mrs. F. B. Stranahan, First Reader Christian Science society.

MRS. FRANKLIN DOUGHTY

Mrs. Franklin Doughty died at Hillsboro, Ore., on July 27, 1923.

Catherine Amanda Rogers was born March 22, 1844 at West Winstead, Conn. With her parents she came to Northwestern Iowa in 1861 and on June 3, 1865 she married Franklin Doughty. They moved to Oregon in 1870. They lived nearly 33 years in Hillsboro. To this union there were born six children, five of whom are living: R. B., A. F., of Beaverton; Henry G. of Hillsboro; Charles E. of Calexico, Cal., and Mrs. G. W. Wilks of Mohler, Ore. There are six grand children and three great grandchildren. Besides her husband and children that are left she has two sisters, Mrs. Esther Doughty of Tacoma, Wn., and Mrs. Emily Doughty of Bay City, Ore. Deceased was over 79 years of age and had been married 58 years. She was a very devoted Christian and was a member of the M. E. church. She had been confined to her home most of the time for a good many years and had been blind for seven months. At one time they lived for nearly seven years where Idaville now is in Tillamook county.

CHINESE PHEASANTS GROWING

G. R. Russell, deputy state game warden, with headquarters in this city is under Capt. Burgdoff, state game warden and is not, as many people suppose, a fish warden. During the past four years he has turned loose in this county 480 Chinese pheasants, which he states are doing exceptionally well considering the wet winters. He recently saw some of these fine game birds down near Sandlake. "Provided the public will co-operate," says Mr. Russell, "this county soon will be well stocked with these pheasants."

Speaking of the trout and salmon recently liberated in the lakes and streams of this county, Mr. Russell states that the Silversides do well in land-locked waters and attain good weight. They will also readily take a spoon and fly, and make a good game fish.

Mr. Russell has had headquarters in this city for four years and previous to that time, he stocked 133 lakes in the Cascades with trout and game salmon.

Regarding the open season on deer in this county the season will begin on the 20th day of August and continue to the 10th day of September this year, the court having ruled against the order issued by the Game Commission, shortening the usual season.

BOX FACTORY BURNS

Fire destroyed the box factory of

Wisner and Son last Thursday at Pleasant valley. The factory was discovered in flames at about three o'clock Thursday morning and the loss was total. The plant originally cost about \$12,000 and the firm carried only \$5,000 insurance. The factory has been in operation for some time. It is not known whether the firm will rebuild or not.

BAYOCEAN NOW IS LIGHTED

The Bayocean lighting system has been thoroughly overhauled the last few days, and is now in operation, lighting the natatorium and the tent city and hotel and other buildings at that place. Sunday last the Rustler Capt. Snodgrass owner, took over several loads of people from Portland, Bay City and Tillamook. His boat has a good carrying capacity and was designed and built by J. S. Hayes of Bay City.

SAYS LUMBER BUSINESS QUIET

Thomas B. Watt, one of the owners of the Brighton mills, was in the city Saturday having come down to attend a meeting of the newly appointed county tax supervising board whose duty it will be to act in the matter of trying to lower county and state taxes. The committee, it is understood, will regularly meet in a room off of the county court's room during the time of their deliberations. As one

of the members of the committee was called away by reason of the illness of relatives, the remainder of the board did not transact any business, aside from talking over matters in an unofficial way.

Mr. Watt says that the lumber business is a little bit quiet at this time, but believes that it will later pick up. His mills, however, are running along on schedule time, and are turning out large quantities of lumber, practically all of which goes out by rail.

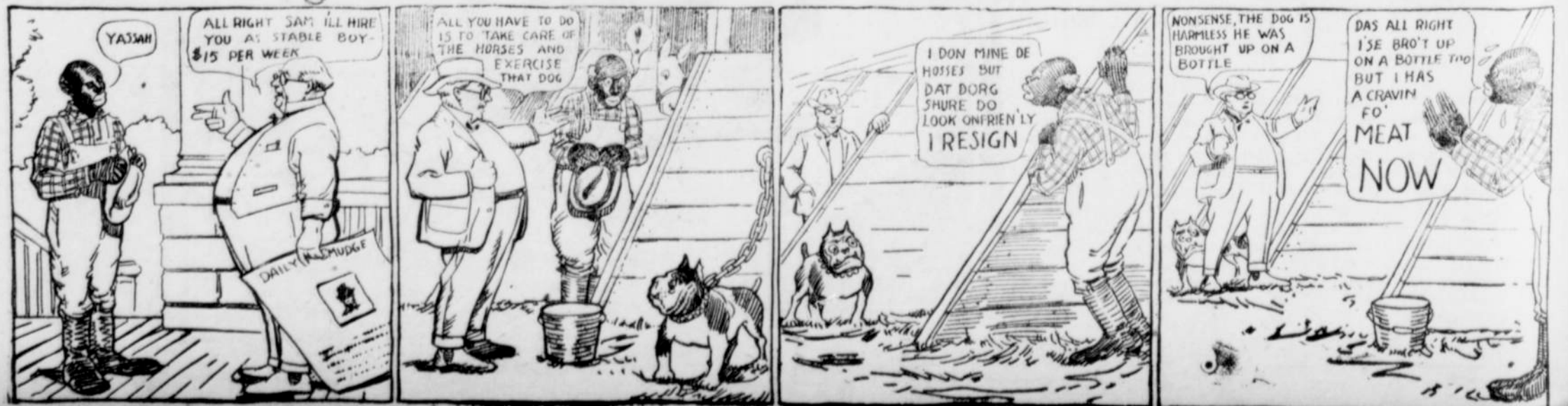
