P. J. WORRALL FUNERAL BY ELKS

P. J. Worrall, formerly builder and proprietor of the Tillamook hotel, died at a local hospital the evening of August 10th, of Bright's disease. His funeral was held last Tuesday at the Christian church, the Elks lodge of this city officiating with the ritual of that order. Immediately after the funeral services the remains were conveyed to Portland in the city funeral car, followed by a delegation of Elks in cars, to the number of about 15 members. Interment was had in Riverside cemetery, Portland upon the arrival of the funeral procession. A beautiful and costly wreath three feet in height, with a stand, containing Lilies of the Valley and purple caryanthemums, the colors of the Elks, was a gift of appreciation by the local lodge, and was placed upon the grave. Deceased was a trustee and charter member of the local lodge. Dr. Turner, the local head of the order, had charge of the ceremonies.

Deceased was born in Shelbyville, Mo., and was in his 66th year at the time of his death. His present wife and a former wife survive, also his brothers, Alfred Worrall, Clinton Worrall and John Worrall. He is also survived by his sons, Art of Washington and F. C. of this city, besides many other relatives in different parts of the country.

Deceased had been a resident of this city for a number of years, and was owner of the hotel Tillamook which he bought when he first came to Tillamook. Deceased was also a Mason.

DAIRYMEN PLAN TRIP HERE

It is probable that a party of 40 to 50 dairymen in the vicinity of Pasco, Washington, will attend the Tillamook county fair in a body if they accept an invitation extended to them by County Agent Pine, manager of the fair. Mr. Pine recently received a letter from J. B. Crane, president of the Bank of Pasco, and has answered the letter with a cordial invitation to the dairymen and ranchers to look us over at fair time, promising them that in addition to fair attractions they will be shown the factors that turn out the cheese that has made Tillamook famous the nation over. Here is the letter which is dated at Pasco: "We are arranging to get the North Bank railroad to furnish transporta-

tion for 40 to 50 of our ranchers who are interested in the dairy business in this vicinity, thinking it would be a profitable trip to make to get acquainted with the dairy business in what we believe is one of the most up to date testing organizations in the Northwest. We would like to hear from you as to the best time to make such a trip. We have been thinking that the middle of September would be as good a time as any. We have mentioned this excursion to your county to a few of our dairymen and ranchers and so far, they have shown keen interest and a willingness to make the trip. Please advise me your idea regarding such a trip. J. B. Crane."

ASSOCIATION FEED PRICES

While gone Mr. Haberlach made arrangements to get considerable mill run at lower prices than have been prevailing for the last few months. While mill run may go lower than these prices, still it is felt that the farmers cannot lose much money by buying mill run at \$25 Tillamook off the car. The Association feed prices today are as follows:

Items include Oats, corn and barley, Corn, any style, Ground barley, Oats and barley, Mill run, off cars, Mill run, warehouse, Molasso meal, Albers Dairy Feed, Middlings, Scratch feed, Egg maker, Wheat, re-cleaned, Linseed oil meal, Cotton seed meal, Rolled Oats, Rolled barley, Milk flo, Beet pulp, Feed Oats, Half ground salt, Oat and vetch hay, alfalfa hay, Best hard wheat flour, Soft wheat flour.

Corn prices remain firm and prices shown above are lower than same can be bought in Portland in car lots, but the association bought this corn last December and is giving the farmers the benefit of the purchase at that time. All grain prices are due for further declines but farmers in the valley are not free sellers and for that reason our prices are fairly high. With the present low feed markets and high price of cheese dairymen are feeding heavily and this is keeping up the milk production to a high point.—Adv

FIRE WARNING

Ordinance No. 272 Section 9. The Fire Warden shall have the power to regulate and control the burning of rubbish and waste matter within the limits of Tillamook City, and he shall have the power to prohibit the kindling or maintaining of bonfires or any other exposed fires within the city limits, whenever in his judgment such fires would be a menace to life or property. Any person who shall kindle or maintain a bonfire or other exposed fire within the city limits contrary to the direction or instructions of the Fire Warden shall be liable to a penalty as hereinafter provided.

Section 16. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any of its sections, or the provisions of any permit issued in conformity herewith, shall, upon conviction, forfeit a fine of not more than Twenty-five dollars for each offense and not more than Twenty-five dollars for every day thereafter, so long as said violation exists and a fine of not more than One Hundred dollars for subsequent violations. Passed May 4, 1914.

Acting under the foregoing provisions of Ordinance No. 272, I hereby prohibit the kindling or maintaining of bonfires or any exposed fires within the city limits without a written permit having been first obtained.
