the new fair ground site. There are conjectures in the minds of people here as to what the proposed establishment of a government landing place for aircraft here really means, but the officer was not communicative on that point.

It is understood that Lyle Smith, who used these grounds while he was flying here two years ago, stated that the Tillamook landing grounds were the finest in the United States, and that they were not excelled anywhere in France or Germany where he saw service in the U. S. Air squadron. It is said that there are take-offs to the northwest and southwest, also to the northeast and the southwest, so that an airship can head in to the prevailing wind at any season of the year, which is a condition not found in many places in the world. The air guests left here for Portland about 4 o'clock p. m. There are no landing places between Tillamook and Forest Grove.

The officer belongs to the Ninth army corps whose headquarters are in San Francisco.

The camera with which the photographs were taken was loaned the Lieutenant by Harold Graves of this city and James Watson, son of Rolie Watson of this place, greeted the lieutenant who was his instructor at Camp Lewis two years ago, when young Watson was a member of the Citizens' military training camp at that post. Lieut. Powell has charge of five war planes at the Vancouver, Wash., military post. County Agent Pine assured the Lieutenant that the fence on the grounds would be removed as the land had been leased for pasture by the county for a time, the lease having expired.

The arrival of the army plane created considerable interest locally, and hundreds of people attracted by the whirring of the propeller, watched the big plane's evolutions over the town.

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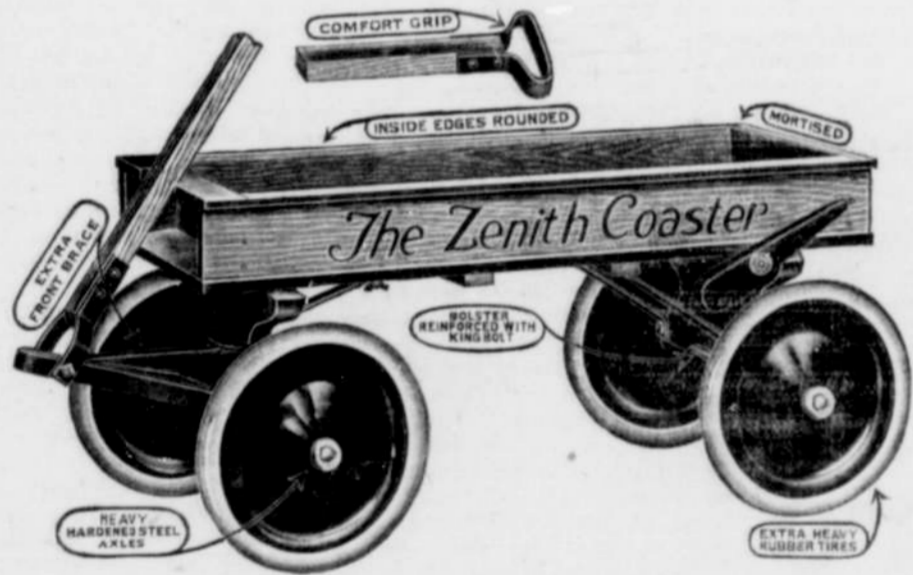
