THE MIKADO

The Mikado is the big comic opera that will be staged at the high school Gym on the 30th and 31st of August under the auspices of the Tillamook American Legion, assisted by the Kiwanis club for the benefit of furnishing club rooms in the new armory.

The large cast are rehearsing nightly and the Tillamook theatre going public will have an opportunity to see a musical play that will be the equal of any of the big road shows that play the larger cities. Because of the expense of big companies getting in and out of the city none of the operas of the class of The Mikado ever make the city.

Brig By Ayr is Saved.

Scotsmen all over the world will rejoice at the favorable conclusion of a movement which has strikingly evinced the hold of Robert Burns over the hearts of his fellow-countrymen. By the pressure of Scottish public opinion, the Ayr (Scotland) town council at last has been forced to abandon the proposed scheme to reclaim part of the bed of the River Ayr above the harbor between the Auld and New Brigs of Ayr. Some time ago, when the matter was first mooted, the proposals were widely discussed in the press as likely to interfere with the amenity of the Auld Brig of Ayr, immortalized by Robert Burns. On the recommendation, also, of the Ancient Board of Scotland, the government office of-works has decided to include the Auld Brig in the list of national monuments. This means that the local authorities of Ayr cannot in the future, without giving notice, do anything in the way of demolishing, removing in whole or parts, structurally altering or making additions to the monument.

Moon Does Not Affect Vegetation.

The director of the office of experimental stations stated some years ago that he knew of no experiments which would support the common belief of the effects of the moon on vegetation. Lunar influence on the weather and vegetation of our planet belongs in the category of mythology, and different peoples have given different interpretations. Under similar atmospheric conditions the same amount of damage will result from a heavy frost in the dark of the moon as in the light of the moon.—P. Connor, United States Weather Bureau.

Vast Sums in New York Banks.

Time and demand deposits in New York banks at the close of a recent week amounted close to \$4,500,000,000. One National bank alone has net time and demand deposits of almost \$900,000,000. The largest check ever drawn in this country was made payable to the Canadian minister of finance in 1917, by J. P. Morgan & Co., the amount being \$96,111,111.11.

FIRST OVER WIRE

Professor Morse's Telegraphic Message Sent in 1836.

Records Show the Words Were "Attention! The Universe! By Kingdoms, Right Wheel!"

Referring to the historical appreciation of Samuel F. B. Morse, inventor of the telegraph, printed in the New York Evening Post, Woodman Morrison of the bureau of public information of New York university writes to the editor of the Evening Post as follows, according to a late issue of that newspaper:

"I wonder how many who read the article by James D. Sayers in the Evening Post of yesterday on the celebration of the one hundred and thirty-second birth anniversary of Prof. Samuel F. B. Morse, inventor of the telegraph, know that the first recorded telegraphic message hangs on the wall of Butler hall at New York university. The message is not that famous one—'What wonder hath God wrought!'—sent by Morse over the forty-mile wire between Baltimore and Washington in 1844.

"Almost ten years before that Baltimore-Washington telegram was sent this message was clicked over a wire: 'Attention! The universe! By kingdoms, right wheel.'

"This message was sent over a wire which ran from one class room to another in the old Gothic structure in Washington square, which was the first home of New York university. Attached to the dot and dash transcript of the message in Butler hall is this note of explanation:

"Sent and recorded in the New York university, January 24, 1836, by Prof. S. F. B. Morse of the chair of art, and his associates, Alfred B. Wall, of the class of 1836, and Prof. Lewis D. Child of the chair of chemistry. Underneath the sign message is a translation in dim pencil marks in Professor Morse's handwriting as follows: 'Attention! The universe! By kingdoms, right wheel!'

"As Mr. Sayers points out in his article, Professor Morse was primarily an artist and not a scientist. He had established at New York university the first chair of art in any American college or university. The organization which grew into the present National Academy of Design was founded by him, and he was its president for the first 16 years of its existence.

"In his younger days Professor Morse painted miniatures on ivory for \$5 and profiles for \$1. He was an associate abroad of the early American artists, Washington Allston and Benjamin West, and the London Adelphi Society of Arts gave him a gold medal for a plaster model of the 'Dying Hercules.' "After his return to America he established the chair of art at New York university and painted portraits of President Monroe, Chancellor Kent, Fitz Greene Halleck, La Fayette and other distinguished men.

"His experiments with the telegraph were carried on in the university, and he definitely perfected his invention there late in 1835."

Spanish Helicopter Rises 81 Feet.

A helicopter built by a Spanish engineer successfully rose to a height of 81 feet and maneuvered in the vicinity of the aerodrome, according to recent reports from Madrid. The machine, which is powered with an 80-horsepower engine, is designed very much along the lines of the ordinary airplane except for the smaller wings which are replaced by a large four-bladed propeller mounted on a vertical shaft. In addition to this performance, the present unofficial world's records for free helicopters stand as follows: Duration of 2 minutes 37 seconds, and distance of 250 feet, both made in France.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Now an Airplane Hospital.

A hospital airplane, the first of its particular type in this country, will soon be built at McCook field, Dayton, O. It was recently announced. It will embody a special design, distinguishing it from ambulance planes now in use, and provides a compartment in which a surgeon can administer to two patients lying on comfortable cots while the plane is in flight. The capacity will be a pilot, a surgeon and two patients, or, if some less essential parts of the equipment are left out, four persons in addition to the pilot can be carried.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.
