

HARDING SERVICES HELD HERE FRIDAY

On Friday at 2 p. m. was held the memorial services for the late President Harding at the High school gymnasium. There was a large and sympathetic audience present.

H. T. Batts acted as chairman of the meeting. Buglers of Company K O. N. G., blew assembly. Lieut. V. L. White read the proclamation of President Coolidge and Governor Pierce. An invocation followed by Rev. Hamrick and Scriptural reading by Rev. Lienkaemper.

The address for the occasion was by Rev. Geo. N. Harness and was an eulogy of the life and character of the late President that found hearty response in the hearts of the audience. "Lead Kindly Light," the late President's favorite hymn, was sung by the chorus and audience. The benediction was by Rev. Woolver, followed by taps rendered by the company buglers. Thus ended the city's part of the national memorial services for the departed President.
