Don't Be Afraid of Making Mistakes;
Better by Far to Learn to
Profit by Them.

It has been said that the man who never makes a mistake never makes anything else—and certainly the cocksure type always does seem to come a cropper sooner or later, remarks a writer in London Answers.

If she, or he, has insisted a good deal on her, or his, own perfections, there is very little sympathy showered on them when they are "out of luck."

A man who is so strictly honorable and exact that his precision is famed in the whole town has been made honorary treasurer of a big public fund. He finds, perhaps, that his accounts will not balance by 48 odd.

He is so absolutely positive about the correctness of his figures that he is unpleasant to the secretary and offensive to the members of the committee when they suggest possibilities of error. When an independent audit reveals that the error is more in the nature of a foolish mistake—a silly slip that a sixteen-year-old clerk ought not to make—the great "I am" goes down like a pricked balloon.

It is not only mere bounce, it is self-confidence that vanishes under the conviction of a first real blunder.

Or take the case of the typist who is loudly contemptuous of every other girl in the office because they make mistakes in spelling and she—well, she doesn't.

"There is no excuse for bad spelling," she informs the office at large, "if you have had even a county council school education and are not ridiculously careless."

Then one day she types a letter to the chief's most particular client, a learned lord, asking "weather" he could see him that week.

The few sarcastic remarks on carelessness made by the chief rankle so deeply that the office atmosphere develops a purple storm aura from which the angry typist emerges minus her job.

It is decidedly safer to make a little human mistake now and again in place of getting upon a pedestal of perfection, which gives one such nasty bruises when the topple-over comes.

Perhaps it is in the long run just as bad to be too perfect as too full of errors. People do not expect such a wonderful lot from the person who never makes any mistakes.

The generals or admirals who have nothing to learn from their staff, the teachers or scientists who throw aside all textbooks because they have reached to perfect knowledge, the business men or housewives who run their affairs as they did five years ago because they are "not given to making mistakes, and their way is the only right way"—all these people are liable to get a nasty shock some day.

Cultivates Perfumes.

A process, the invention of M. Daniel, professor of botany at Rennes, by which the perfume of flowers is greatly increased has been explained before the Academie des Sciences in Paris. By taking two plants of the same species and grafting one on the other—notably a wormwood on a chrysanthemum—he found not only that the grafted wormwood developed remarkably, but its flowers gave forth a perfume much more powerful than that of the original plant. Moreover, the chrysanthemum had given to the wormwood flower something of its own perfume. The professor collected the seeds of the grafted wormwood and the following year obtained from them some fine plants. They had this peculiar feature—that while the flowers of some of the plants emitted a perfume similar to those of the original graft, others were absolutely without odor.

Beauty Doctor for Pet Dogs.

A beauty doctor for the dog is Madame's latest whim in Paris. Not only must she preserve and enhance her own special charms, but those of her pet canine as well. For about \$8 the Tou-tou's nose can be made more aristocratic, and \$5 will give Mr. Bull-dog a number of distinguished wrinkles about the mouth. And there is even hope for his legs, if they are not sufficiently bowed. Only time and money are needed. A tall badly turned can be modified for the modest sum of little more than a dollar. Raw Starch is Digestible.

It was generally believed that raw starch was harmful, and that all starchy foods must be thoroughly cooked to be digested properly by human beings. This has been disproved in experiments conducted by the Department of Agriculture.

Cornstarch, wheat starch, and rice starch were all completely digested when eaten in a frozen pudding in which they constituted 20 per cent of the entire dish.—Popular Science Monthly.
