AUGUST BREAKS THE RECORD

Last month was thought to be a record breaking month for the collection of fines by this county, but August has July distanced in that respect. On the 29th inst. there had been received by the Circuit court the sum of \$390 while the Justice court had collected \$910.49 making the total sum from both sources of \$1310.49 with a gross gain of \$342.49 over the fines collected for the previous month, and there are yet three days to hear from. These fines are collected for violations of the liquor law, speeding, plain and unvarnished drunkenness and other charges.

TO CELEBRATE CONSTITUTION WEEK

There will be a state wide celebration of Constitution week in Oregon. The dates for such observance will be Sept. 16 to 22, inclusive, when each community is expected to prepare a program, and hold appropriate services calculated to bring the Constitution into prominence, and for the consideration and study of that grand old safeguard of the liberties of the republic. That it should be more care fully studied and quoted and understood, is necessary on account of the rising younger generation and especially is it necessary to be explained to people who are coming in such great numbers from European countries. They have a right to know about it, and during the week of the celebration, efforts will be made in this county, and presumably in others, by county superintendents to have each district school in each county duly observe the week with exercises and programs. H. T. Botts, W. J. Reichers and Rollie Watson, have been named a county committee, and County Superintendent of Schools, G. E. Lamb will take up the matter with the various districts in the county looking to organization and observance of the week in Tillamook county.

It is also believed that the ministerial association, and the patriotic societies and fraternal organizations will assist in the good work of reverencing the Constitution, and seeking to have its provisions better and more generally understood, thereby leading up to better citizenship and greater patriotism.

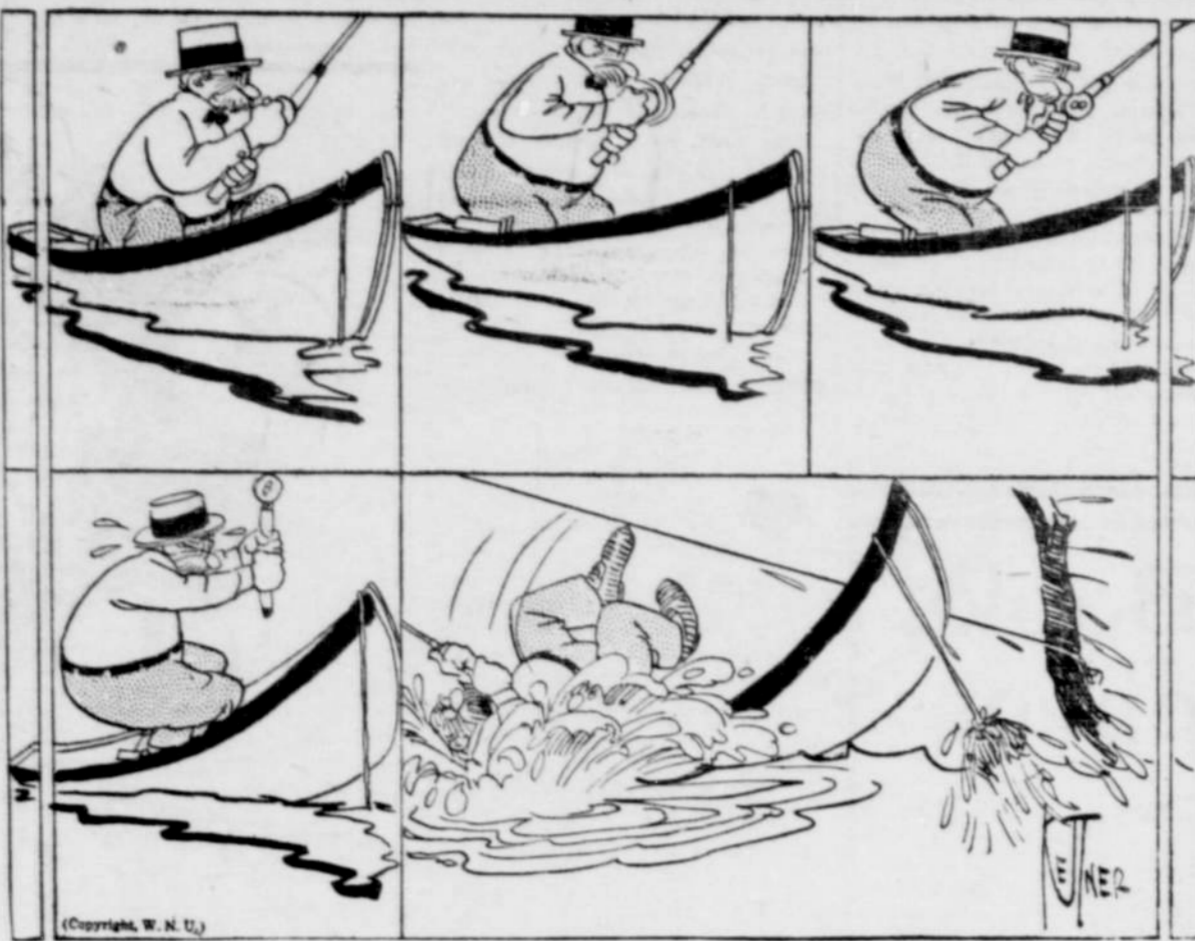
F. AND G. CLUB SATURDAY NIGHT

In answer to an enquiry regarding diet:

"Then probably you could use more milk to advantage. You mention only two quarts daily for two children and two adults, one of whom is trying to gain weight. The children would do well to have a quart or nearly a quart each, and you should have a pint at least for yourself and from a pint to a quart (according to his special needs and his assimilation) for your husband. Then with the increase of milk you can easily cut down your meat and egg bill.

"A good rule to remember is that for every extra half pint of milk used in the daily diet the other protein foods, such as meat, eggs, fish, cheese, may be reduced by two ounces without any dietetic loss. Milk is usually the least expensive and the most easily served and assimilated of all the protein foods."
