STATE BOARD OF HEALTH CALL

The State board of health, composed of Dr. Rosenberg of Portland, president, Dr. C. J. Smith, Portland, Dr. W. B. Morse, Salem, Dr. M. Barbee, Portland, Dr. Geo. E. Houck, Portland, Dr. W. T. Phy, Hot Lake, Dr. Fred A. Strickler, Portland, was in the city last Saturday, and met with the county and city health officers, the members of the county court, members of the city water commission, and the Mayor.

At an informal dinner at the Tillamook hotel, Dr. Rosenberg, president of the board, stated that his party was making a tour of the state, and taking note of health conditions in the various towns and at the beach resorts, and conferring with local health officers and other county authorities.

It was necessary for the board to make these trips, especially to beach resorts, where loose sanitary conditions were liable to prevail, and where bad water and poor sanitation were often causes of typhoid fever epidemics. He stated that the county health and city health officers were doing good work, but intimated that there was laxity in following strict sanitary rules at some of the beaches, which may result in an enforcement by the county authorities of the laws governing in such cases. The tourists and campers have a right to be protected against possible unsanitary conditions, although some of the beaches the meeting, and during the dinner were found in excellent shape. Mayor Merle Smith and others spoke at length. The visitors paid a high compliment to the Tillamook beaches in general, and remarked about their growing popularity with the resorters.

They said that a due observance of the health laws, was all that was required. They were pleased with the health conditions in Tillamook. It developed at the meeting that there had been but one case of typhoid fever in the county within the past seven years and that had its inception in a valley town, and was not due to any unsanitary condition in this county. The visitors spoke in glowing terms of the growth of this city, and of the seeming prosperity of the whole Tillamook county region.

ber and gravel hauled to its grounds, preparatory to erecting its 210 ft. by 100 ft. warehouse on the south side of the railroad track. The fill north of the track will be completed before long, but it is not expected that a building will be placed on it until next year. The tract acquired north of the railroad track is 210 ft. by 90 ft.

Production of milk is keeping up well and is running about 25 percent ahead of last year. Shipments to Los Angeles to date total about 23,000 boxes against 20,000 to San Francisco and 20,000 boxes to all points in Oregon and Washington.

Sales of loaf cheese total about 4000 boxes more than there is stock available. 500 loaf hoops have been ordered and this will give a total of 1500 loaf hoops or 2100 boxes per week and it is expected that this will take care of all the winter's milk, as it will take 75,000 pounds a day to fill these hoops.

High school students will be given an opportunity to enroll during the week of September 10, because the county fair is being held that week, hours which will conflict as little as possible with that have been selected. The superintendent and the high

school principal will be in the office all day Monday, September 10, and in the forenoon of Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday of that week, to assist students in selecting their course for the year. The office will be closed on Thursday, which will be school day at the fair grounds.

Parents are urged to see that their children enroll for their high school work on these days, as more attention can be given their individual needs at this time, and much time can be saved, and mistakes avoided, if subjects are carefully selected.

High school students who have in mind any particular higher institution of learning, should have a course selected for them which will enable them to gain admission to that school without difficulty when they have graduated from high school.

Grade pupils entering the local

school from other schools for the first time should call at the office on these days, so that they may lose no time in being assigned to their proper room. Wherever possible they should present report cards from the last school attended.

The new Liberty school will house the elementary grades for the coming school year. All pupils except beginners should report to the room to which their last report card admits them.
