

S. S. ENROLLMENT FOLLOWS FAIR WEEK

The attention of old and new high school students is called to the fact that, because of the County Fair next week, the dates on which they may select their courses for next year have been changed from ones usually selected. Students may enroll all day Monday, Sept. 10, and on the forenoon of Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday of that week. These days were selected so that all could have an opportunity without interfering with their attendance at the fair.

The County Fair Board is giving free admission tickets to each grade until the week following the fair. Pupils may secure their tickets by calling at the high school building Monday, September 10, between 1 and 3 P. M.

In the past a number of Tillamook citizens have helped out of town boys and girls thru high school by giving them work which would enable them to earn their board. A number of girls have already written requesting places where they may work for their board during the coming school year. FORMER COUNTY AGENT MAKES VISIT LOCALLY

R. C. Jones of Corvallis, formerly County Agent at this place, was in the city swapping talk with County Agent Pine, and greeting old friends last Tuesday. Mr. Jones has the distinction of being Tillamook's first county agriculturist, and now is in the dairy department work at the Oregon Agriculture college. He came in to this county by the old Trask wagon road, and tried to get a deer or two, but for some reason the deer "saw him coming" and hid. He describes his trip over the old Trask road as being quite laborious, but he got here, and really enjoyed that quit, and not much used route.

BIG LOGGING TRAIN OPERATED BY COATS

Many people in this city do not know that the A. F. Coats Lumber Co., which is operating a big logging camp on Bewley creek, has a railway several miles in length, with two locomotives and flat cars by which the omotives and flat cars by which logs are taken from camp to the Tillamook river, and thence towed up to the slough in this city for the use of the mill. The railroad is standard gauge in width, and the logs are shot from the cars into the Tillamook river, which is full of the titans of the forest all the way down to its confluence with the Trask.

LOCAL HERDS IMPROVE, SAYS VETERINARIAN

County veterinarian, J. N. Shaw was in the city Friday. He states that the dairy herds in the southern part of the county have been tested north as far as Beaver, where he is now working. In the whole territory tested, he has found but nine reactors. In this same territory last year 23 reactors were found; this year's test showing a gain of over 50 per cent in improvement, and a corresponding decrease of tubercular cows in the same ratio. This surely is gratifying to herd owners, and shows the value of the testing associations, which work is now considered a vital part of the dairy business, as dairymen find that it pays, and pays big. Testing not only gives a herd that passes the test a clear bill of health, but it shows the dairyman to a certainty how to weed out unproductive and unhealthy cows.

At the coming stock exhibits at the fair, Dr. Shaw stated that animals to be shown there, need not pass another test unless they come from herds where tuberculosis was found at the last herd test. This means that if you have animals that you wish to exhibit, you will not have to have them tested, unless tuberculosis was found on your place last year.

It was reported that four cars upset at a turn at the Lamb corners south of town Sunday night; and a number of minor auto accidents were reported as occurring on Sunday.

In answer to an enquiry regarding diet:

"Then probably you could use more milk to advantage. You mention only two quarts daily for two children and two adults, one of whom is trying to gain weight. The children would do well to have a quart or nearly a quart each, and you should have a pint at least for yourself and from a pint to a quart (according to his special needs and his assimilation) for your husband. Then with the increase of milk you can easily cut down your meat and egg bill."

"A good rule to remember is that for every extra half pint of milk used in the daily diet the other protein foods, such as meat, eggs, fish, cheese, may be reduced by two ounces without any dietetic loss. Milk is usually the least expensive and the most easily served and assimilated of all the protein foods."
