STORY IN COUNTRY GENTLEMAN

It is said that a story of the Tillamook county cow testing association, and a write up of the principal dairy herds of the county will appear in a future issue of the Country Gentleman. The story was written by F. L. Ballard, who spent some time here a month or two ago, with headquarters at County Agent Pine's office. Tillamook dairy business is getting lots of advertising of late.

AN EXAMPLE IN REFORESTATION

The condition of the great burn on the Wilson river as reported by a party of forest protection officials is an object lesson in what can and should be done in reforestation and in prevention of fires. That great area of 30,000 acres is already reforesting itself by growth from seed buried in the debris, but the remains of the burned forest are a source of danger. If they should take fire and destroy the young seedlings, the material for natural reforestation would be gone and nothing could be done but the costly work of planting.

Much salvage could have been recovered if the fire-swept forest had been promptly, but that forest is now a total loss—the growth of centuries wasted. If logging had been followed by piling and burning of the slashings, danger to the new growth would have been eliminated, but now that new growth must take its chance. Fire from surrounding tracts may extend to the charred trunks and stumps, and thence over a wide belt of live timber. Logging and burning of debris would not only have protected the new growth but would have made the burned area a firebreak for protection of other tracts.

Inaccessibility prevented logging and thus is responsible for the present situation. That goes to prove the wisdom of opening entrance to remote areas by means of railroads and highways. It proves forest protection and reforestation to be a many-sided problem, which can be solved only by application of a comprehensive policy, to which the combined efforts of federal and state governments and timber-owners are necessary.—Oregonian

AUGUST COURT FINES GREAT HELP TO TAXES

The total of fines, mainly prohibition violations, for August was \$1860.74. This is the largest amount of fines during any single month in the history of the county. Of these fines \$1360.74 were paid in to Justice court and \$500 went to the Circuit court. There still remain fines levied in August amounting to \$970, in conjunction per month. It would seem that the serving, and which fines will have to be paid later to the county, or the prisoners will have to lay them out in jail at the rate of one day for each \$2 thereof. If any of these fines are paid in cash, it will add to the above figures, which add materially to the revenue of the county. The total expense of the sheriff's office is \$685 per month. It would seem that the Sheriff is taking care of the costs of his office with a handsome overplus for other county expenses.
