

FORMER RESIDENT HELD FOR BIGAMY

Most of the people of this city will remember a young man named John P. Varnum, who clerked here for two or three firms, and who after forging a check on the First National bank left here owing a number of debts.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 16.—John Preston Varnum, 31, university graduate and son of Colonel Charles A. Varnum, United States army, in jail here charged with forgery and other crimes, including bigamy, says that one of the three wives from whom he has obtained no divorce was Miss Alma Ross, daughter of a bank official at Portland.

Varnum was charged with having gone honeymooning on forged checks and to have been veiled in borrowed clothes. One of the forged checks, the police say, was for \$500, given to the mother of his latest bride, Miss Dora Cross, of Cherrydale, Va., whom he married August 18. The check was returned by the bank marked "no funds."

When Varnum received Miss Cross's promise to marry him, he is said to have slipped on her finger a beautiful solitaire borrowed from one of his room-mates, and and the clothes of two of his room-mates are now being held by a local hotel to secure payment of a bill contracted by Varnum and his bride during their honeymoon.

According to the prisoner's story the Portland girl was his first wife, and the second wife was Miss Marie Jackson of San Francisco.

Varnum's latest bride was inclined to be loyal to him, despite his other alleged misdeeds, until she learned of his previous marriages and failure to obtain divorces before marrying her. "I might forgive the other things," she said.

Of course the taxes for 1923, will not be available until after the 1924 tax levy, but in 1922, the assessed value of all beach lots in this county was \$1,273,835, and the tax due there on was \$41,502.46. It will be greater next year. For the purpose of determining the growth of beach property value, take the year 1914, when the assessed value was \$1,120,175, and the amount of tax due for that year was \$23,450.57, and there is shown in 1922, a net increase of \$13,779.93, in taxes over 1914.

Tillamook county has more beach resorts than any county in the state, and judging by recent years, the increase in the next few years will be something phenomenal. Nowhere is there a stretch of ocean beach and bay that is equal to that of Tillamook county. The scenic beauty of our beaches is admitted by all. And digressing from the beaches, it is but fair to say that we have other natural capital in our many beautiful rivers and mountain streams, whose little valleys are marvels of beauty, and which in time will become the sites for many summer homes, where mountain heights and little canyon spaces will charm for residence purposes. Our beaches and mountain resources have scarcely been touched by the hand of exploitation.

As population and travel increase, as they must, Tillamook county will become the summer mecca of future thousands. The completion of the Roosevelt highway will give added impetus in this direction, for it is bound to be the popular tourist coast line of travel.

One may keep within bounds of practical future vision, and still be able to see wonderful growth for this county. Add to its natural and scenic capital the future growth of its lumber and dairy business, and you will become optimistic by the very logical force of estimation.

(Continued from page one) the course are entitled to a one year state teacher's certificate without graduation. Only students whose work has been strong throughout their first three years of high school are eligible to enroll in this course.

Regular swimming classes for boys and girls will be conducted by the teachers in charge of physical education, Miss Phillippi and Mr. Sheeley. It is hoped that all who cannot swim will learn before the year is out. For advanced swimming students work in lifesaving procedure will be given.

A third year of Latin will be added this year, the course being planned so that a student who desires may take the full four years of Latin before graduation.

AUSTIN DEMURRER IS OVER RULED

Progress is reported in the Austin case, which has been hanging fire for some time past. Some time ago, A. M. Austin brought suit against the city of Tillamook to quiet title to property on Third street. The city answered the suit by setting up their exact procedure for making levy on the property for the improvement of paving on Third street, west. The case was delayed for a period of six months, waiting for a reply to the city's answer from the late Judge Holmes, who was counsel for Austin. In the meantime, Judge Holmes died, and T. H. Goyme became attorney for Austin. Goyme filed a demurrer to the city's answer, and the matter came up before Judge Bagley at the last term of Circuit court on Sept. 5th, when the demurrer was over ruled, and attorney Goyme was given until October 1, 1923, to reply, if he saw fit. And here the case rests. The city was represented by Barrick & Hall, the latter being city attorney.
