

REGISTRATION LAW HAS BEEN OBSERVED

The dairy bull registration law has been very well observed by Oregon dairy breeders as a whole during the life of the law, reports H. N. Coleman of the O. A. C. dairy staff, secretary of the registration board. Certain violations could not be prosecuted because of flaws in the original act which have now been amended and set right. The measure provides that no person of firm in Oregon may sell, give away, or offer for public use, or buy or accept for use any dairy bull that is not registered, pure bred, and licensed to be sold. Public service is deemed as breeding any cow in herds of five or more cows not owned by owner of bull. The dairy department at the college constitutes the dairy registration board. Responsibility and penalty for violation of the act was placed by the legislature on the receiver as well as the purveyor of animals sold or used illegally. Permission to obtain a temporary license to sell animals meeting the registration requirements but not yet licensed, may be granted by the board, made up of T. M. Brandt, head of dairying at the college, and members of his staff. The people over at Bayocean are expectantly looking forward to road connection with this city next season, upon which so much depends in the matter of tourist patronage for that resort.

BEAVER SECTION HAS BRUSH FIRE

A brush fire, evidently carelessly initiated by campers, started on the Ollie Wood place at Beaver last Monday and burned on the hill back of town and over part of the graveyard. Wm. Powell, supervisor, and his road crew turned out, with other campers and farmers and fought the fire to a standstill. School was hastily adjourned, and most of the scholars took their books home. Many of the old residents remembered the fire that occurred at Beaver, in 1915, when sixteen houses were destroyed by the leaping flames of a forest fire. It is related that the Gilbert Brothers at Beaver, lost upwards of \$85,000 by destruction of their store and other property, while a number lost their homes. Too much emphasis cannot be laid on caution by everybody. At this time wood is dry as tinder, and once a forest fire gets beyond control, great damage to property, and even life may result.

CALF CLUB SHOW DISPLAYS ANIMALS

At the recent session of the county fair, the several calf clubs of this county showed fifty-nine calves, most of which were pure-breds. This means that fifty-nine children in this county were interested competitors for judging honors. Calf Club Leader Kennedy did not have to do any persuading, as the young people were anxious to show their pets, and had them in fine condition for the big show. The calf clubs of the state are doing grand work in interesting and educating the young people, principally sons and daughters of farmers, in the matter of better cows and greater milk check. Moreover, the work will persuade a large majority of the boys and girls to stick to the farm, as a business, instead of going to the precarious life that awaits them in the big cities.

BIG SLUGGING MATCH IS WON BY CHAMPION

After a slugging match lasting less than two full rounds, last Friday night, Dempsey knocked out Luis Firpo, the "Bull of the Pampas." In the first round Dempsey knocked Firpo down five times, and hit the floor twice himself, in the same round. In the first half of the second round, Dempsey laid the South American low for the count. 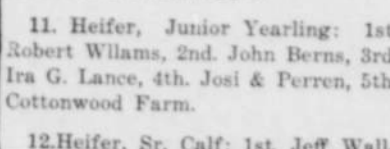

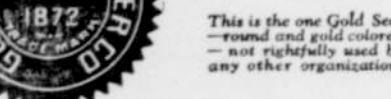
