

DAIRY DEPT. SUPT. MAKES FEW REQUESTS

L. B. Ziemer, superintendent of dairy products for the Oregon state fair this month, has made the following request to butter and cheese makers to enter their products for that exposition:

The Oregon State Fair opens Sept. 24 and closes Sept. 29. All butter and cheese exhibits should be sent to the Secretary of the State Fair Board, Fairgrounds, Salem, so as to reach there not later than September 23rd.

Butter makers and cheese makers should not overlook the importance of making an exhibit of their products at the State Fair. It should be remembered that the State Fair is the great display window for Oregon dairy products. The Butter and Cheese exhibits have been entirely too small in past years and it is up to the butter and cheese makers to exhibit their goods and show to the people of the State that we make an excellent quality as well as a large quantity of same.

Following are the rules and regulations governing entries: 1—There shall be an entry fee of \$1.00, charged in this department. 2—Creamery butter shall consist of butter made in a factory from milk of cows kept on two or more farms, by two or more individual firms. 3—Awards shall be made on the following scale: Creamery butter by the commercial score only, but samples testing 16 per cent moisture or over shall be disqualified. The commercial score shall be based upon the following scale: Flavor, 45; Body, 25; Color, 15; Salt, 10; Package, 5; Total 100. 4—Prizes will be awarded for Cheddar Cheese only. The Cheese shall be scored on the following scale: Flavor, 45; Texture, 15; Body, 15; Color, 15; Finish, 10; Total 100. 5—No butter maker operating a creamery which is owned by any State institution shall be eligible to compete.

Butter: Creamery butter shall be packed in a cube 7 1/2 X 7 1/2 X 7 1/2 inches inside measurement. No prints or rolls shall be eligible for entry in this class. Lot No. 1—Pro rata \$500.00. To be divided on the basis of score of all entries of creamery butter scoring above 90 points; provided, that no entry shall be entitled to more than \$3.00, per point above minimum.

Cheese: Not less than 20 pounds of Cheddar Cheese. Lot No. 2—pro rata \$500.00. To be divided on the basis of score of all entries above 90 points; provided, that no entry shall be entitled to more than \$2.00, per point minimum.

Winners of the highest scoring butter or cheese will be furnished with a diploma showing number of entries and score.

In answer to an enquiry regarding diet:

"Then probably you could use more milk to advantage. You mention only two quarts daily for two children and two adults, one of whom is trying to gain weight. The children would do well to have a quart or nearly a quart each, and you should have a pint at least for yourself and from a pint to a quart (according to his special needs and his assimilation) for your husband. Then with the increase of milk you can easily cut down your meat and egg bill. "A good rule to remember is that for every extra half pint of milk used in the daily diet the other protein foods, such as meat, eggs, fish, cheese, may be reduced by two ounces without any dietetic loss. Milk is usually the least expensive and the most easily served and assimilated of all the protein foods."

HOW HOLSTEIN COW CAME TO TILLAMOOK

The Holstein-Friesian breed of cattle have strong representation in this county, and the story was briefly told the other day to the Headlight as to how they originally came to be brought to this country, together with the names of those who brought them.

In 1917, Kunze & Jones went back to Ohio, and to Lake Mills, and Madison Wisconsin, and brought to Tillamook county eighteen head of pure bred Holstein-Friesian heifers. In 1919 another consignment of the same type was brought here by Bert Foulkes and H. Y. Rodgers, who secured eighteen heifers and two bulls.

Prior to these consignments of 1917 and 1919, which came from Wisconsin and Ohio, a number of local Holstein breeders, among whom were Charles, Henry, and Gust Kunze, had begun a foundation.

The late Benjamin Hathway on his Kilehis river farm had begun breeding operations along progressive lines to increase his pure-bred strains of Holstein cattle, from which foundation there sprung some of the best bred cattle in Tillamook county.

From the Chas. Kunze herd, which was sold with his farm near Fairview were dispersed his herd, the major part of which was secured by F. R. Beals. Last year Mr. Beals sold what was reputed to be the highest price herd of dairy cattle in the state, to the Carnation milk people of Washington. Five of the herd sold are said to have subsequently produced over 100 pounds each per day. "Tillamook Lola May De Kol," established a world record in her class for milk and butter production, and was the outstanding individual cow in the 1922 Pacific International Livestock exposition at Portland. Tillamook has produced three grand champions at the State fair and at the International at Portland, during the past four years.

J. J. Rupp led off with "Countess of Somerset." The grand champion was Beals' "Lady Aggie Ormsby of Rock," and "Tillamook Lola May DeKol." Holstein breeders of this county
