U. S. DEBT CUT IN LAST YEAR

Treasury Report Shows Reduction of \$613,674,342.

SURPLUS OF 309 MILLIONS

Washington.—Complete figures covering the government's financial operations for the fiscal year show receipts for the twelve months of \$4,007,185,480 and expenditures of \$3,697,478,920, indicating a surplus of \$309,706,560.

Part of the success in building up a surplus while at the same time the public debt was reduced was traced by the treasury to the administration's tariff policy, which, it was declared, resulted in the establishment of a record, receipts in customs duties totaling \$561,028,506.

Income and profits taxes paid into the treasury during the last twelve months, like the receipts from customs collections, also exceeded expectations, the total being \$1,878,907,428, while the estimate given in the budget last December was \$1,500,000,000.

"During the last twelve months," a formal statement, issued by the treasury, said, "about \$4,500,000,000 of government debt matured and was either retired or refunded, thus completing the treasury's program for reducing the \$7,500,000,000 in short-dated debt maturing within about two years which was outstanding at the beginning of the administration."

"In other words, since the refunding program was announced on April 30, 1921, about \$4,070,000,000 of Victory notes have been retired, treasury certificates of indebtedness have been redeemed from \$2,520,000,000 to about \$1,080,000,000, maturing on quarterly tax payment dates, and war savings securities have been reduced from \$718,000,000 to about \$200,000,000, while new treasury savings securities to the amount of about \$245,000,000 and about \$4,100,000,000 of treasury notes maturing on various quarterly tax payment dates during the years 1924 to 1927, have been issued and are now outstanding.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC SPENDING \$90,000,000 TO SERVE WEST

COMPREHENSIVE and impressive program for construction work, new facilities and improvements generally to maintain adequate transportation service for Pacific Coast states has been launched by the Southern Pacific company, it was announced here today.

Expenditures totaling in excess of \$50,000,000 are involved in the improvement program, which is to be carried into effect as rapidly as possible. This program is in addition to the recent purchase by the Southern Pacific company of a record number of freight and passenger cars, refrigerator cars and powerful locomotives at a cost aggregating \$40,000,000.

The announcement calling for renewed activity throughout the territory served by the railroad follows close upon the heels of the decision of government officials at Washington to accept the United States court decision affirming the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific merger.

Included in the improvements are the building of new lines, extensive double tracking, new classification and industrial yards in different cities, freight terminals, crescenting plants, rock crushing plants, station buildings, additions to shop equipment, replacement and strengthening of bridges, line changes to eliminate curves, new and heavier ballasting and heavier rails, new tunnels and improvements to existing ones and so on.

Outstanding in this work are such projects as the building of the National Cut-off and a new entrance to Portland, double tracking sections between San Francisco and Ogden and over the Tehachapi Mountains, from Tehachapi to Seiwert, which will give complete double track from Bakersfield to Mojave, new station facilities at Sacramento, extensive new terminal yards and freight facilities in Los Angeles and a large tie and timber treating plant in Oakland.
