BUDGET IS APPROVED BY TAX COMMISSION

The 1924 city budget which was approved by the county tax supervising committee this week, has passed through its different phases, and now is definitely the amount total that will meet the expenditures of the city the coming year.

The general purposes expenditures given by the budget approximate \$11,140. Road purposes, \$6,148. Library, \$1,000; Interest general bonds, \$7,335; Sinking funds, \$5,000; Interest on road warrants, \$320; Armory, \$3,100; Emergencies, \$2,200. Estimated receipts: Fines, \$1,000; Licenses, \$100; Miscellaneous, \$703; Total, \$36,243. The last three items under the head of estimated receipts should be expected from the city tax levy.

The Kiwanis club members met last Wednesday on the occasion of their weekly luncheon. This being fire prevention week, Thos. Coates, chief of the fire department, gave an interesting address on the subject of fire prevention. Rev. EXAMINATION CALLED FOR FOREST RANGERS

The Forest Ranger examination is to be given on October 23 to qualified applicants between the ages of 21 and 35 at thirteen towns in Oregon and seven towns in Washington, according to an announcement of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, received at the District Forester's offices in Portland.

The examination is given to fill vacancies in the position of forest ranger in the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. For this position young men of good education and those physically able to stand the hardships of field work on the Nation-

REBECCA E. BARGER DIES HERE SUNDAY

Rebecca Elizabeth Barger died in this city on Sunday last at 2:25 o'clock, aged 72 years, 5 months and 6 days. Rebecca Elizabeth Barger was born in Pennsylvania May 1, 1851. Her father and mother were pioneers of Oregon, settling near Forest Grove, and in Tillamook county, spending 15 years of her life in this county. She is survived by her husband, James E. al Forests are especially desired. To such, the work of the Forest Service has in store an attractive and interesting career, provided they are fond of the great outdoors. Forest officers in many cases has served as a training school for positions outside of the Government service. Many men as a result of the experience gained as rangers have been able to secure responsible positions as managers of live stock companies, lumber companies, and in many other lines. The entrance salary is \$1220 per year for the states of Oregon and Washington, and ranges from \$1220 to \$1620 for Alaska. However, in addition to the basic salary, rangers located on districts where automobiles are necessary in their work are allowed a mileage on personally owned machines, or if saddle and pack animals are required, the necessary forage is furnished by the Government. Moreover rangers, while absent from their official stations on Government business, are reimbursed for their traveling expenses. In many cases comfortable houses are furnished the men as well as all necessary tools and equipment.

The Government Compensation Act also applies to all Forest officers under which, in case of accidental injuries while on official duty, hospital and doctors fees are paid and in case of death the families are allowed an annuity under certain conditions. The Government Employees Retirement Act also applies to the position of forest ranger.

A one-day written test composed largely of practical questions concerning timber, forest fires, surveying and grazing is given on October 23. Applicants are also given credit for education and experience. The age limits of 21 to 35 do not apply to persons entitled to preference because of military or naval service.

The examination will be given by the Forest Supervisors at twenty-one locations in Oregon and Washington. Information concerning it and application blanks may be secured from any of these headquarters. D-6-L-16

LEG IS FRACTURED WHEN TRUCK TURNS

A big truck which operates between Portland and Tillamook went off the grade about two miles east of Hebo last Tuesday morning at about 4:30 o'clock in the morning. The truck went over an embankment to the bottom of the grade, a distance of nearly 50 feet. The driver was unhurt, but W. E. Lyons, who was asleep inside the truck superstructure, was seriously injured. The Oregonian truck driver arrived at the scene of the accident soon after it occurred, and procuring a touring car near the scene, brought the wounded man to the Shearer-Merrick hospital in this city. Dr. Shearer found the man, who weighs close to 245 pounds, suffering from injuries to the left hip, a fracture of the left leg between the knee and ankle, and bruises. Lyons is reported to be doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances. The truck was coming into Tillamook at the time of the plunge, and was loaded with freight for this city.

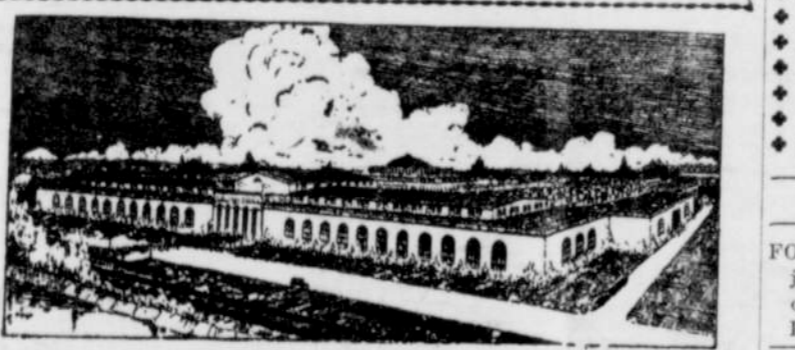
Stock Comes Far to Pacific International
