State Law Establishes Penalty for Changing Identity of Automobiles

(Continued from last week.)

weights and measures or his duly appointed deputies.

Section 39. Jurisdiction.—All police judges or recorders of any city or town or justices of the peace or district judges of the county, or circuit courts, shall have concurrent jurisdiction of all violations of the provisions of this act, committed within their respective city, town, county or district. (Laws 1921, Special Session, Chap. 8, Sec. 13.)

Section 40. Power to Arrest; Immediate Trial; Procedure.—Any police officer of any city, any marshal, deputy marshal or watchman of any incorporated town, or any sheriff or deputy sheriff of any county, or any constable of any district, shall have full power and authority within the limits of their jurisdiction, or as hereinafter provided, to arrest any persons known personally to any such officer to have violated any of the provisions of this act, and to immediately bring such offenders before any magistrate having jurisdiction, and any such persons so arrested shall have the right to an immediate trial and all other rights given to any person arrested for having committed a misdemeanor; and if such hearing can not then be had, he released from custody on giving his personal undertaking to appear in answer to such violations at such time and place as shall then be indicated, secured by the deposit of a sum equal to the maximum penalty for the offense charged, or in lieu thereof by leaving the vehicle being operated by such person with such officer; or in case such officer be not accessible, be forth with released from custody on giving his name and address to be officer making such arrest and depositing with such officer a sum equal to the maximum fine for the offense for which such arrest is made, or in lieu thereof by leaving the vehicle being operated by such person with such officer; provided, that in such case the officer making such arrest shall give a receipt in writing for such sum or vehicle and notify such person to appear before the most accessible magistrate, naming him, on that or the following day, specifying the place and hour. In case security shall be deposited as in this section provided, it shall be returned to the person forthwith on such person being admitted to bail.

Section 41. Penalties for Violations. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this act or who fails to provide himself with the proper limit, license or licenses prescribed herein, shall, upon conviction thereof, or upon entering a plea of guilty to a complaint or indictment charging him with the violation of any of the provisions of this act, unless otherwise provided in this act, be punished by a fine of not to exceed four hundred dollars (\$400), or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed one year, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court. The court before whom such conviction may be had, may also, in its discretion, and as a part of the punishment for violation of this act, suspend, for a period not to exceed one year, the license or permit of the person so convicted. Justices of peace and district judges are hereby given concurrent jurisdiction with circuit courts to try and dispose of violations of the provisions of this act. Local magistrates, within their respective jurisdictions, are also hereby given the power to permanently revoke any license referred to herein upon conviction of the licensee of a violation of any ordinance having for its purpose the regulations of traffic or the operation of motor vehicles, when such ordinance is not inconsistent with the provisions of this act.

Section 42. Disposition of Fines.—All fines and penalties collected under the provisions of this act for violations thereof shall be paid by the court or judicial officer collecting the same to the city treasurer of any incorporated city or town, if such conviction be had in the police court, and to the county treasurer of the county, if such conviction be had in a justice, district or state court, and shall be, by the city or county treasurer receiving such fine, credited to the road fund of the county or street fund of the city, as the case may be; provided, that whenever such fines or penalties result from prosecutions initiated by or from arrests or complaints made by any state traffic officer, deputy inspector, member of the state highway commission, or by any deputy or assistant or employe of the state highway commission appointed by said commission under the provisions of section 4432, Oregon Laws as amended by chapter 9, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, then in any such events the penalty and fine, exclusive

of court costs, shall be by the court or judicial officer collecting the same, paid to the state treasurer, who shall place the same to the credit of the state highway fund to be used and expended as are other state highway funds; provided, that no judge, justice of the peace, police officer or other magistrate or officer of any city, town, county or state shall pay any part of such fine or fines to any off-

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CANADIAN RADIO IS FAVORITE HERE

The boys at the Fire department get Calgary, Alberta on the radio almost every night, and like its programs.

The following is a copy of a letter of appreciation, recently sent in by Chief Coates: "The music from CFCN comes in so clearly that the boys of the Tillamook Fire Department do not have to wait for the now familiar voice of CFCN to know where it is coming from and it is only fitting that I should write you a letter of appreciation for the many of your concerts which we have had the pleasure of listening to. On Sunday morning October 28th, some of the boys were 'taking it all in' until 3 A. M. Pacific time, enjoying your piano concert with Hallock & Watson of Portland.

"We also heard your announcement of the Firemen's Annual Ball on November 2nd, and if it is not too much trouble, you can tell Chief Cappy Smart that were it not for so many intervening ranges of mountains, Chief Coates of Tillamook, Oregon, and his whole gang would surely be there.

"For your information, Tillamook is on the Pacific Coast, about 60 miles west of Portland, Oregon, and 50 miles South of the Columbia river, and your station comes in just as clearly as any, and better than most. Sometimes we have a little difficulty in separating it from KPO of San Francisco or the Los Angeles stations, when you are on the air at the same time.

"Our receiving set is home made,

and the hook-up is changed almost daily—the only time it is not changed being when our would-be radio genius has his long day off and goes fishing. While he is doing that he is figuring out new changes and the rest of us are more or less patiently trying to 'tune in' under the latest combination.

"For our 'magnavox' or 'loud-speaker' our would-be genius has fastened one ear piece of a head-set to an old phonograph horn, and at times your station comes in so loud that it is almost as if the orchestra was in the room, and too loud to be really pleasant, so that we have to quiet it down and the room is about 20 feet by 30 feet. Judging by results we think our would-be genius, Terry by name, has made a pretty stagger at building a radio set, for your concert last night, when you played 'God Save the King' as the closing number, came in so clearly that there was not the slightest interference.

"If you care to acknowledge receipt of this letter by radio, we will be listening in on Saturday evening from 8:30 P. M. Pacific time or 9:30 P. M. Mountain time, until you close down for the night at your 10 o'clock.
