MOTOR VEHICLE LAW

icer making arrest or arrests under the provisions of this act. (Laws 1923, Chap. 172, Sec. 1.)

Section 43. Certifying Convictions to the Secretary of State.—Upon the conviction of any person for violation of any of the provisions of this act, the magistrate or other judicial officer before whom the proceedings are held shall immediately certify the facts of the case, including the name and address of the offender, the character of the punishment and the amount of any fine imposed, to the secretary of state who shall enter the same in an appropriate record. The secretary of state shall send notices of all convictions to the persons convicted and the judgments of the court on such convictions, to the county clerk of every county in this state, who shall enter the same on the list of registered vehicles or registered chauffeurs, as the case may be, opposite the name of the person convicted, or on a list of other offenders, which he shall maintain in his office as a public record in the same manner as the lists of registered vehicles and chauffeurs, and on due application furnish copies of such lists to the magistrates or other judicial officers of the county before whom violations of provisions of the act are triable. If any such conviction shall be reversed upon appeal therefrom, the person whose conviction has been so reversed may serve on the secretary of state a certified copy of the order of reversal, whereupon the secretary of state shall enter the same in the proper book or index in connection with the record of such conviction, and shall also notify each county clerk of the same.

Section 44. Disposition of Moneys by Secretary of State.—All moneys received by the secretary of state under the provisions of this act shall be deposited in the state treasury as are the other moneys received by him. After payment of the expenses of administering this act, as provided therein, the moneys remaining shall, on March fifteenth and September fifteenth of each year, be deposited as follows: Three-fourths thereof shall be transferred to the state highway fund for such purposes as are provided by law, and one-fourth thereof shall be remitted by warrant of the secretary of state by (to) the county treasurers of the various counties of the state in proportion to the amount of such moneys which shall have been received from such counties for licenses.

Section 45. Motor License Fund Created in Counties.—There shall be created in each county of the state a special fund to be known as "motor license fund" and the moneys received from the secretary of state in accordance with the provisions of this act shall be deposited to the credit of such fund.

Section 46. Disposition of County Motor License Fund.—All moneys paid into the county motor license fund shall be used and disbursed preferentially in the order named, as follows: 1. For the payment of interest and retirement of any bonds that may have been issued or which may hereafter be issued by the county for the purpose of road construction and improvement.

2. In case no bonds have been issued, or in case other provision has been made for the payment of interest or retirement of such bonds then such funds may be used by the county to defray the expenses of preparing the roadbed, bridges, etc., for the construction of state highways, as provided by law.

3. In case provision has been made for the payment of the cost of pre-

paring the roadbed, etc., or in case no funds are required, or for any other reason no funds are required for the purpose, then the moneys may be used in the discretion of the county court, in any other manner for general road improvement; provided, that in counties of over 100,000 population, according to the United States census of 1920, the board of county commissioners may deposit their portion or any part thereof of the funds arising under this act, or any other county fund, with the state treasurer to be expended by and under the direction of the state highway commission for the laying out, grading, betterment of paving of roads outside of any such county but leading into roads of said county, the location of said roads to be designated by said board of county commissioners; and provided further, that the state highway commission is hereby authorized to lay out, grade, better or pave said roads.

Section 47. Shipment of Motor Vehicles from State.—It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to ship on any ocean going vessels any motor vehicle out of the state of Oregon by vessel, boat or by any other character of water craft, without first obtained a written permit at the point of shipment, as hereinafter provided. In cities of 5,000 or more inhabitants, such permit shall be issued by the chief of police, or other corresponding official, and in cities or towns having a population of less than 5,000 or in other political subdivisions of the state, such permit shall be issued by the sheriff of the county having jurisdiction. Such permit shall be issued in triplicate upon forms furnished by the secretary of state, the duplicate copy of same to be filed with the secretary of state, and the triplicate copy to be retained by the chief of police, sheriff or other official, as the case may be.

Section 48. Unlawful to Alter Identification Numbers.—That any person who shall knowingly buy, sell, receive, dispose, conceal or have in his possession any motor vehicle as defined in this act, whose manufacturer's serial number or any other distinguishing number or identification mark shall have been removed, defaced, covered, altered or destroyed for the purpose of concealing or misrepresenting the identity of the said motor vehicle, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200 or by imprisonment for not more than six months, or both.

Section 49. Notice of Dismantling and Transfer of Engine.—Before any person, firm or corporation shall wreck, dismantle or disassemble any motor vehicle, or substantially alter the form thereof, such person, firm or corporation shall give notice in writing upon forms to be furnished by the secretary of state, of the intention so to do to the chief of police or marshal of the city or town in which such work is to be done, or if such work is to be done outside of an incorporated city or town, such notice shall be given to the sheriff of the county in which the work is to be done.

Upon the transfer of an automobile engine or motor, except a new engine or motor, transferred with intent that the same be installed in a new automobile, and whether such transfer be made by a manufacturer or dealer or otherwise, the transferee shall, within three days after such transfer, file with secretary of state, upon a blank to be furnished by the secretary of state, a notice or report containing the date of such transfer and a description, together with the maker's number of said engine or motor, the name and postoffice address of the purchaser, lessee or other transferee.

Section 50. Special Mark if Original Mark is Faulty.—Any person who knowingly has in his possession any

motor vehicle, tractor, trailer or semi-trailer or parts thereof from which the manufacturer's serial or identification number or mark has been removed, defaced or obliterated or changed shall forthwith file with the secretary of state a sworn statement describing such vehicle or parts thereof and showing the source of his title and, if known the reason for such removal, defacement, obliteration or change. If satisfied as to the facts, the secretary of state shall assign to such vehicle a distinguishing number and instruct such authorities as he may designate for that purpose to cut, stamp or carve into the engine or motor of such vehicle or parts thereof or into the frame of trailer or semitrailer a special identification number or mark which shall there-

into the \$1500 class, and from that down to the more modest little home, costing \$500. They all have the same beautiful view seaward, and the same charming location. Oceanside, it is reported, is held to be the most sanitary resort in Oregon and the state board of health, after inspection, so pronounced it. There are no shacks. Dwellings must be painted at least two coats. The water supply comes from an uncontaminated mountain stream a mile away, and is piped in a four inch wooden main with laterals that bring it to every dwelling in the townsite.

The Rosenberg brothers own 320 acres, extending down the beach and back into the hills. Almost any kind of location can be had. Like the seats

of a great amphitheatre, the tract extends from the beach to the mountains, gradually rising from the sea-level, and from almost every part, there is outspread that grand view of mother ocean. Many Tillamook people have handsome beach homes here and others are preparing to build in the near future. Portland, McMinnville and other valley towns are represented, and even far away Spokane is included, with a neat little bungalow.

Maxwell point has been tunneled and a passage about 200 feet in length gives access from the south side to the north side of the point, where one emerges upon a beach strewn with water agates and moonstones and other beautiful specimens of nature's handiwork. Up the beach a short quarter of a mile is Arch rock, with others of its kind isolated from the mainland by the incoming tides; but human ingenuity can circumvent even the tides for in this case Rosenberg brothers have a cable bridge that leads from the beach to one of the group, which has been named Angel Cake rock, and by trusting this means of communication, which is about 250 feet in length, one is able to reach the rock and connect at low tide with Short beach, which is also famed for its pretty agates, making a beach extension that cannot be excelled by any beach on the coast, and which is full of interest, and almost kaleidoscopic changes, as one passes over it, in quest of scenic values. These scenes varied as they are, continue on north to the promontory upon which Cape Mears light sheds its warning of red and white flashes to the lonely mariner in the darkness night. The white tower at Cape Mears is plainly visible from Maxwell point.

To return to Oceanside proper, the town contains a restaurant, fish mar-

ket, grocery store, bath house and office buildings. There also is a large dance hall, where "the poetry of motion" may be indulged by those who like that healthful and happy recreation.

Loading from Oceanside to Netarts is a planked road, with bridges and culverts, a distance of two miles. This is a county road, the proprietors paying their cost of construction. This road later will be extended past Cape Mears to a connection with the Bay-ocean road, which is to be finished during the coming year, thus making a loop road about 22 miles in extent from Tillamook, via Netarts, and home via Bayocean. When completed this will be the most popular scenic drive in the county, and one which will be utilized largely by Tillamook people, and tourists generally.

The exploitation of the Tillamook beaches has just begun. Already its many beaches have made this county one of the most popularly sought in Oregon. Its beaches are growing yearly by leaps and bounds and any money spent by the county to link these beaches up with the outside world, will add millions of dollars to this county in tourist revenue. The taxable assets of the county will thus abundantly repay such investment in roads.
