MOTOR VEHICLE LAW

(Continued from last week.) Section 3 Public Service Commission to Regulate Automotive Transportation Companies.—The public service commission of Oregon is hereby authorized to supervise and regulate every transportation company as defined in section 1 of this act and to fix reasonable rates, fares and charges to be charged by each such transportation company, to prescribe rules and regulations for the governing of all such transportation companies, to prescribe and require such transportation companies, to provide adequate facilities for conveyance and transportation to supervise and regulate the accounts, service and safety of operation of each such transportation company, to require such transportation companies to file annual reports and from time to time to furnish such other data as said commission may require in order to administer this act, and to supervise and regulate such transportation companies in all other matters affecting the relationship of such companies with passengers and shippers, and said commission may require a uniform passenger or freight manifest to be carried by each vehicle. The public service commission of Oregon shall have power and authority by general order or otherwise to prescribe rules and regulations applicable to any and all such transportation companies. The public service commission of Oregon, in the exercise of the jurisdiction conferred upon it by the constitution and laws of this state, and by this act, shall have the power to make orders and prescribe rules and regulations affecting such transportation companies, notwithstanding the provisions of any charter, ordinance or permit of any incorporated city or town or county, and in case of conflict between any such order, rule or regulation of any such charter, provision, ordinance or permit the order or regulation of the public service commission of Oregon shall in each instance prevail, but cities and towns may enact and enforce reasonable regulatory ordinances including the imposing of regulatory licenses not destructive of the general purposes of this act. (Laws 1921, Special Session, Chap. 10.)

ROOSEVELT HIGHWAY NEARLY COMPLETED

Fred C. Baker has taken the time to get some interesting information about the Roosevelt highway, which he has permitted the Headlight to use. Mr. Baker is secretary of the Roosevelt Memorial Highway association. The figures quoted are his own. Two hundred and five and eight tenths miles of standard highway have been constructed. Of that amount 59 miles are paved and the remainder graded, surfaced or under construction. This is little more than half of the entire distance, and there remains 203.2 miles of highway still unimproved, and which does not come up to the state standard in grade and

width. A stretch of road in Clatsop county will have to be relocated. Coos county, with 77 miles of road in the county, has more improved, and less unimproved road than any county on the line. Tillamook county, with 65 miles of highway within its borders, comes next with the largest amount of standard highway, which amounts to 51.4 miles of improved highway and is second in the smallest amount of unimproved highway, which amounts to 14.3 miles. Like Coos county, Tillamook has but two small pieces of unimproved highway, being but eight miles more than Coos has. One of these stretches of unimproved highway is from Mohler through Wheeler and Brighton to the Jetty, and the other from Rockaway to Garibaldi. The Miami road is used from Mohler to the Miami bridge for through travel, until the road from Brighton to Jetty is completed. Curry county has the largest number of miles of highway of any of the other coast counties, amounting to 95.4 miles. Of that amount 36.8 miles are improved, and 63.8 unimproved. Clatsop county has 44.5 miles in the highway. It has 31.2 miles improved and 13.3 miles unimproved. Lincoln county with about 65 miles of highway running thru it, has 20 miles already improved, the remainder having been surveyed and ready for improvement. Lane and Douglas counties, with about 50 miles, have no roads improved to standard in the coast sections of those two counties. North of Hebo to Neskowin, 17.8 miles have been graded and surfaced; Neskowin to south of Kernville 21.9 miles of surfacing and grading under construction.

REDWOOD OUTLASTS OREGON CEDAR Recently J. A. Todd moved the Todd

hotel annex from property sold last summer to John Lamar, to a lot of his own farther west, and fronting on First street. Twenty-six years ago, the Todd brothers, Prince and Joe, built a two story building, which after various occupancies finally became the present hotel annex. In moving the building, it was discovered that the redwood blocks placed under the sills twenty-six years ago, were still in good condition, and they will again be placed under the old building in its new location. Thereby hangs a tale. When the Todds were putting up the building over a quarter of a century ago, they were approached by Geo. Elliott, who offered to sell them the selfsame redwood blocks, which were bought by the brothers. Elliott, who then lived over on the Hauhocean place, at the upper end of Bayocean, was watching the beach at a point on the spit north of the Cape Mears lighthouse one day, and espied a big redwood log coming into a place where drift wood from along the coast always collects. He secured the log, and worked it up into blocks. Evidently, it had floated out to sea from the Mendocino beach down along the California coast, and finally, after going northward for a long time, got into a down the coast current, and came ashore at Bayocean. Some cedar blocks placed under a portion of the house at the same time the redwood was utilized, were found to be unsound and practically rotten, showing that as compared with cedar, which is supposed to be noted for its lasting qualities, the redwood was far superior.

KNOCKED DOWN BY AUTO TRUCK

About 8:30 Thursday morning Jess Parks, a carpenter of this city, was struck by an auto truck driven by Allan Page at the intersection of Second avenue and Fourth street, and run over, the auto passing over both legs above the knees. The injured man was picked up by bystanders and conveyed to the Economy pressing parlors, where Dr. J. E. Shearer was called to attend him.

It was found that no bones were broken, but that there were some severe bruises which probably will lay the patient up for a few days. Page was driving west on Third and Second avenue east, when Parks attempted to cross from the Conover store to the opposite side of the street, and was struck. The machine was stopped within about eleven feet.

KIWANIS CLUB BACKS PROJECT

At the Kiwanis luncheon Wednesday at the noon hour, the board of club directors made a report to the club endorsing the project of a direct road from Tillamook to Forest Grove and Hillsboro, either by the Fork river route, or via the north fork of the Trask river. The report was accepted, and it was voted to support the project.

A committee of three composed of C. I. Clough, G. A. Reeher and H. H. Rosenberg was appointed to take up the matter of a short route to the valley, with the commercial bodies in Washington county and the county courts of Tillamook and Washington, and with a view to working out of a plan for financing a project. Considerable interest was manifested by the club members, and it is believed that a strong sentiment will be crystallized in support of a short road to Forest Grove and Hillsboro.
